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STATEMENT OF

PURPOSE

The purpose of my Sabbatical was as follows: (1) the development of a Dance
Directory for Southern California Community college dance professionals containing
information regarding their programs and four year transfer information. (2) to open a line of
communication with identified four year colleges regarding transfer of students from
Community Colleges into four year college dance programs.

The process used was through visitations and telephone interviews. The telephone interviews were with four year universities and only when requested. The visitation process included actual on site visits to 32 Southern California community colleges which met the criteria to be included in the study. In order to qualify, the community college had to have at least one full time faculty member and a student performing group.

Forty-one community colleges were contacted by telephone with 32 meeting the visitation requirements. Visitation dates and times were established with each of the qualifying colleges. I observed classes and interviewed the dance director/coordinator in reference to the information needed. I also attended dance concerts at selected colleges (see appendix).

The topics addressed with four year institutions were; entrance information, scholarships, specialization, performance opportunities and transfer units. Visitations were requested; however some universities preferred to have phone interviews.

The information obtained from visitations and phone interviews is expressed in two ways; in the body of my sabbatical report and in the completion of a Southern California Community College Dance Directory. For clarity I have listed the body of this report in alphabetical order, not in the order visited. The Community College Dance Directory will be spiraled bound and mailed to all community colleges contacted in this sabbatical report.

Cerritos College

Contact Person: Janet Sanderson, Dance Chairperson

Department Affiliation: Physical Education and Fine Arts.

The dance program at Cerritos is divided between the Departments of Theater Arts and Physical Education. Jazz and Tap Dance are taught under the Theater Arts Department and the remainder of the dance program is taught under the Physical Education Department. The Dance Program is coordinated through the Dance Chairperson.

The program has one full time faculty member, Janet Sanderson, and eight adjunct faculty Daniel Berney, Arlene Brackett, Lisa Goldschein, Hiroko Hojo, Erin Landry, Robert Salas, Karen Shiel and Georgia Well.

The teaching and storage facilities consist of one dance studio (40 feet by 25 feet) and two costume closets (6 feet by 9 feet). The office is in the Physical Education Building (6 feet by 10 feet) for all dance faculty.

The program presents two dance concerts and two informal productions each year.

The Fall and Spring Semester Concerts are choreographed and performed by faculty and students and presented in the Burnight Center Theater. The theater seats 435 with a performance stage of 40 feet by 40 feet. The facility has 6 dressing rooms (16 feet by 9 feet) with restroom and shower facilities located off the backstage hallway. Works in Progress and Classroom Studies are presented in the studio at the end of each semester.

Cerritos has an active Dance Club which receives Associated Student College Council funds to present a professional dance company performance in the theater each year.

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Ballet, Modern, Jazz, and Tap with additional offerings in Dance History and Dance Notation. Future curriculum development is being planned in the areas of Dance Topics and Dance Appreciation.

Cerritos offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU Long Beach, CSU Fullerton and California Institute for the Arts.

Chaffey Community College

Contact Person: George Reeder, Dance Director

Department Affiliation: Theater Arts

The dance program at Chaffey College is under the Division of Theater Arts. The program has one full time faculty member, George Reeder, and one adjunct faculty member, Michele Jenkins.

Teaching facilities are shared with Physical Education and Theater Arts. Modern and Jazz are taught in the dance studio (40 feet by 40 feet) which is shared with the Physical Education while Tap and Movement for Actors is taught on the theater stage, which is shared with Theater Arts. Dance has one office in the Theater Arts Building (6 feet by 12 feet) for all dance faculty.

The emphasis at Chaffey College is in theatrical dance which is reflected in the dance performance schedule. Chaffey offers a student dance concert one year and a major musical presentation in combination with Theater Arts the next year. This is the only college visited with this performance format.

The theater seats 350 with a performance stage of 80 feet by 60 feet. It has a green room and separate men's and women's dressing/make-up rooms (12 feet by 15 feet).

Restrooms and lockers are located in both the men's and women's dressing room facilities.

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Ballet and Jazz, and only beginning levels in Modern and Tap. Additional courses offered in Choreography and Dance Production with an emphasis toward the theatrical and musical aspects of production and performance.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Chaffey offers a major in Theater Arts with a minor in Dance from which the majority of students transfer to CSU Fullerton and CSU Long Beach.

Citrus College

Contact Person: Diane Woodward, Dance Coordinator

Department Affiliation: Music Department

The dance program at Citrus College is under the Music Department and includes two full time faculty members, Diane Woodward and John Vaughan, whose positions were established for the 1999-2000 academic year.

Modern, Jazz and Tap are taught in the dance studio (40 feet by 70 feet) which is a shared facility with the Music Department. The program has two offices, one is located off the dance studio and the second is within the music building.

The new faculty members are currently evaluating curriculum, facilities, performance opportunities and future growth for their new program.

A dance concert is not presented at this time. Future concerts will be presented in the Campus Theater, which seats 1,472 with a performance stage of 54 feet by 40 feet. The theater has four dressing/make-up rooms; two small rooms are 9 feet by 12 feet while the two larger rooms are 18 feet by 18 feet. Restroom facilities are located off the backstage hallway.

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Jazz, Modern, Ballet, Tap and Choreography.

College of the Canyons

Contact Person: Phylise Smith, Dance Director

Department Affiliation: Humanities

The dance program at College of the Canyons is under the Humanities Division and includes one full time faculty member, Phylise Smith, whose position was established for the 1999-2000 academic year.

Modern, Jazz and Ethnic dance are taught in the studio (35 feet by 60 feet). The office is located adjacent to the studio (6 feet by 12 feet) and is for all dance faculty.

The new faculty member is currently evaluating curriculum, facilities, performance opportunities and future growth for the new program.

A dance concert is not presented at this time. Future concerts will be presented in the Campus Theater, which seats 450 with a performance stage of 50 feet by 35 feet. The theater has four dressing/make-up rooms; two small rooms are 6 feet by 9 feet while the two larger rooms are 18 feet by 36 feet. Restroom facilities are located off the backstage hallway.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Compton Community College

Contact Person: Marjeritta Phillips Dance Educator and Fitness Instructor

Department Affiliation: Physical Education

The dance program at Compton College is under the Division of Physical Education and includes one full time dance faculty member, Marjeritta Phillips, whose position was established for the 1999-2000 academic year.

Modern, Jazz and Ethnic classes are taught in the dance studio (35 feet by 60 feet) which is a shared facility with Physical Education. The office (9 feet by 9 feet) is located in the Physical Education facility and is for all the dance faculty.

The new faculty member is currently evaluating curriculum, facilities, performance opportunities and future growth for the new program.

A dance concert is not presented at this time. A program of Works in Progress and Classroom Studies is presented in the gymnasium at the end of spring semester. The Campus Little Theater is too small for dance productions, requiring productions to be presented in the gymnasium.

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Ballet, Modern, Jazz and African dance.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Cypress College

Contact Person: Marilyn Glatley, Dance Coordinator Department Affiliation: Theater Arts and Dance

The dance program at Cypress College is under the Theater Arts and Dance division and includes two full-time faculty members, Marilyn Glatley and Staci Finn. Adjunct faculty include Arlene Brackett, Steve Escudero, Jeff Hendrix, Erin Landry and Robert Salas.

The teaching facilities at Cypress consist of one dance studio (30 feet by 60 feet), where the majority of the dance classes are offered. Tap is taught in the studio theater and dance rehearsals are in the aerobics room. The office is in the theater arts complex and consists of one very large room for all Theater Arts and Dance faculty. One small office is available to adjunct faculty (9 feet by 7 feet) which is located in the Physical Education

Building. Storage facilities are located in the theater complex and consist of one large area designated for dance (20 feet by 30 feet).

The program presents two performances a year. Faculty Concert is presented in the fall choreographed by faculty, students and guest artists; performed by students. A Student Concert is presented in the spring, choreographed and performed by students. The productions are presented in the theater which seats 620 with a performance stage of 50 feet by 40 feet. The facility has 4 dressing/make-up rooms; two small rooms are 15 feet by 20 feet while the two larger rooms are 20 feet by 30 with adjoining restrooms and showers.

A workshop for K-8th grade students is offered in the Fall which includes instructional sessions ending in a performance by the participants.

Beginning through advanced levels are offered in Ballet, Modern, Jazz while only beginning and intermediate levels are offered in Tap. Additional course offerings in Ethnic Forms, Dance History, Choreography and Rehearsal/Production.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Cypress offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU Long Beach and CSU Fullerton.

East Los Angeles College

Contact Person: Selina S. Chi, Dance Coordinator

Department Affiliation: Physical Education

The dance program at East Los Angeles College is under the Physical Education

Department and includes two full time faculty members, Selina S. Chi and Rick Crawford.

Adjunct faculty are Wanda Lee Evans, Benjamin Hernandez and Miyoko Komori.

The teaching facilities are two studios; the smaller of which is 48 feet by 33 and the larger, 48 feet by 60 feet. Storage cabinets located at the end of each studio are approximately 30 feet by 8 feet. The office is located between the two studios in the Physical Education complex and is one large area (approximately 20 feet by 20 feet) with five desks.

Spring Student Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed by faculty and students; performed by students. The theater seats 2000 with a performance stage of 60 feet by 40 feet. The facility has 4 dressing rooms; the two smaller ones are 9 feet by 12 feet while the two larger ones are 18 feet by 30 feet. Restroom facilities are located off of the backstage hallway. Works in Progress and Classroom Studies are presented in the gymnasium at the end of each semester.

Beginning and intermediate courses are taught in Ballet, Modern, Jazz, Folklorico and Ethnic forms, additional courses are offered in Choreography and Production.

The program has an active Dance Club and sponsor's master classes and workshops.

East Los Angeles does not offer a Dance Major or Certificate Program.

El Camino College

Contact Person: Elizabeth Oberstein Department Affiliation: Fine Arts

The dance program is under the Division of Fine Arts and includes two full time faculty, Elizabeth Oberstein and Bernice Bossman. Adjunct faculty members include Peter Abilogu, Jose Costas, Carola de la Rocha and Ruby Millsap.

The teaching facilities at El Camino consists of two dance studio (45 feet by 65 feet and 44 feet by 60 feet) where the majority of the dance classes are offered. Storage

facilities are located at the end of each studio and are approximately 35 feet by 8 feet. The dance offices are located in the Physical Education Building and in the Fine Arts Building.

El Camino College has a resident company, Oui Geometer. Performing members of this company are students who are selected from an open campus audition. Oui Geometer performances are held in the campus theater during the fall semester, presenting choreography by faculty and guests artists. The Concert Dance Ensemble performs in the spring, choreographed and performed by faculty, students, guest artists and alumni. The Campus Theater seats 354 with a performance stage of 26 feet by 30 feet. The facility has separate men's and women's dressing/make-up rooms (40 feet by 15 feet) and contains restrooms and shower facilities.

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Tap, Ballet, Modern and Jazz with level additional courses offered in History, Ethnic Dance Forms, Choreography and Production.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

El Camino offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU Long Beach and CSU Fullerton. Future plans are to offer a Certificate Program in Professional and Commercial Dance.

Fullerton College

Contact Person: Kathe Whalen, Concert Director Department Affiliation: Physical Education

The dance program is offered within the Physical Education Department and includes one full-time faculty member, Kathe Whalen, and three adjunct faculty members Regina Aleong, Jody Castilan and Patricia Lefler.

The teaching facilities are one dance studio (60 feet by 65 feet) and an additional shared space with Physical Education (16 feet by 72 feet). Two storage cabinets (approximately 6 feet by 9 feet each) are located in the studio. The office (6 feet by 9 feet) is located in the Physical Education building.

The program presents two concerts a year which are choreographed by faculty, students and guest artists; performed by students. The fall concert is presented in the dance studio and the spring concert is presented in the campus theater. The theater seats 500 with a performance stage of 50 feet by 30 feet and has one central make-up room (15 feet by 25 feet) with two adjoining dressing rooms (12 feet by 18 feet), each having restroom facilities.

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Ethnic, Ballet, Modern, Tap and Jazz with additional courses offered in Dance for Theater, Dance Production and Rehearsal and Dance Performance.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Fullerton offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU Long Beach and CSU Fullerton.

Glendale Community College

The dance program at Glendale College is under the Visual and Performing Arts

Department and includes one full time faculty member, Lynn McMurrey and 10 adjunct faculty

Patti Cox, Linda Curry, Lynda Daniels, Ed Douglas, Phyllis Eckler, Jim Kolb, Dora Crannig, Joey

Letteri, Cindy Picker and Carolee Wiles.

The department has two studios, one small (25 feet by 30 feet) and a large studio (80 feet by 50 feet) which also is used for a performance facility. A storage space of 25 feet by 40 feet is located behind the studio. Two cupboards, 6 feet by 12 feet, are located in the equipment cage. The office (15 feet by 12 feet) is for all dance faculty with a student lounge (20 feet by 20 feet) adjacent to the small studio.

The program presents two concerts a year. The Fall Student Dance Concert is presented in the Dance Studio Theater one year and the Campus Theater the following year. Spring Concert is presented in the Dance Studio Theater choreographed by faculty and students, performed by students. Concerts presented in the Dance Studio Theater have a performance schedule of nine shows; three afternoon shows, shortened to fit class schedules, and six complete evening performances. This performance schedule exceeds that of other colleges visited.

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Ballet, Modern, and Jazz with additional courses in Movement for Theater I and II, Movement for Musical Theater, Choreography I and II and Dance Production. Tap is not offered at this time. Special courses are offered in Physical Reintegration, Movement Development-Infant/Preschool and Movement Development-5-7 years/7-12 years which are not offered at other community colleges.

The program has an active Dance Club and does a series of raffles during the year to fundraise for master classes, costumes and scholarships.

A dance major is offered from which the majority of students transfer to UCLA, UCI, CSU Long Beach.

Golden West College

Contact Person: Nanette Brodie

Department Affiliation: Performing Arts

The dance program at Golden West College is under the Performing Arts Division and includes one full time dance faculty member, Nanette Brodie, and six adjunct, faculty Carol Caniglia, Jody Casillan, Jeff Hendrix, Lilia Llorens, Louise Mahoney and Angelika Nemeth.

Golden West has two studios; the smaller of which is 30 feet by 90 feet and the larger, 40 feet by 90 feet. Storage areas, (13 feet by 26 feet) are located at the end of each studio. The office (12 feet by 8 feet) is located between the two studios and is for all dance faculty.

Studio Concerts are held at the end of each semester. These performances are presented in the larger dance studio, choreographed by faculty and students: performed by students. College Invitational Concert is presented in the theater, performed by guest artists, faculty, students and guest community college performance groups. The theater seats 325 and has a performance stage of 35 feet by 40 feet. There are separate men's and women's dressing/make-up rooms, 30 feet by 20 feet, with restroom/shower facilities located in the hallway.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Ballet, Modern, Jazz and Tap with additional courses offered in History, Flamenco, Dance for Musical Theater, Dance Production Workshop and Choreography.

The program has an active dance club which helps with all aspects of the concert from publicity, costuming, lighting and serving of refreshments.

Golden West does not offer a Dance Major or Certificate Program.

Grossmont College

The dance program at Grossmont College is under the Theater and Dance Department and includes two full time faculty members, Kathy Meyers and David Mullen. Adjunct faculty are Allison Cutri, Darla Gonzales, Marta Jiacoletti-Keeney, Heidy Giersch-Schmidt, Colleen Shipkowski and Terry Wilson.

Teaching facilities are shared with Physical Education. The studio is (25 feet by 40 feet) and has four storage cabinets (approximately 5 feet by 8 feet) located in the studio. The office (6 feet by 10 feet) is located in the Physical Education complex for all dance faculty.

The department presents two concerts a year. Fall student concert is presented in the campus theater, choreographed and performed by students. Spring Student/Faculty Concert is presented at the San Diego Performing Arts Center, choreographed and performed by faculty and students.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Ballet, Modern and Jazz with additional course are offerings in Dance and Movement for Theater, Improvisation and Choreography, Spot Strength of Dancers, Stretch and Alignment for the Dancer, Turn Class, Dance History and Teaching Creative Movement for Children. Future curriculum development is being planned in the areas of Alignment and Correctives, World Cultures and Dance Topics.

Grossmont offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to CSU San Diego, UC San Diego, CSU Long Beach and UCI, also offers a Dance Certificate in Dance Performance.

Irvine Valley College

Department Affiliation: Physical Education

The dance program at Irvine Valley is under the Physical Education Department and includes one full time faculty member, Kathryn Milostan-Egus and 10 adjunct faculty. The adjunct faculty are Christine Baltes, Victoria Barrett, Norman Beedy, Cassandra Bruno, Mari De la Palme-Mulroy, Pauline Hagino, Chifra Holt, Larua Lhotsky, Rebecca Russell and Damon Rago.

The teaching facilities consist of two studios which are shared with Physical Education and Continuing Education. The smaller studio is 30 feet by 45 feet and the larger studio is 45 feet by 55 feet, two storage cabinets (approximately 4 feet by 8 feet) are located in each studio. The office (6 feet by 12 feet) is located in the Physical Education complex for all dance faculty.

The department presents two concerts a year. The Fall Concert is presented in the large Dance Studio, choreographed and performed by faculty and students. Spring Concert is presented in the gymnasium, choreographed by faculty and students; performed by students.

Beginning through intermediate courses are offered in Ballet, Modern, Tap and Jazz.

Additional courses are offered in Dance History, Alignment and Correctives, Ethnic Dance

Forms, Dance and Movement for Theater, Improvisation and Choreography.

Irvine Valley offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU San Diego, CSU Long Beach and UC Santa Barbara.

Long Beach City College

Contact Person: Sheree King, Dance Director

Department Affiliation: Theater Arts

The dance program at Long Beach City College is under the Theater Arts Department which includes one full time faculty member, Sheree King and six adjunct faculty. The adjunct faculty are Arlene Brackett, Andrea Elliott, Erin Landry, Linda Lewis, Karen Shiel and Liliana DeLeon-Torsiello.

The teaching and office facilities are located in the Physical Education complex and are shared facilities; one studio (60 feet by 57 feet) and a rehearsal space of 34 feet by 24 feet with six storage cabinets (approximately 6 feet by 8 feet). The office is one large area (approximately 30 feet by 20 feet) with two desks for Dance and a Physical Education Professors.

The program presents a Student/Faculty Concert in the fall and spring semesters, presented in the theater, choreographed and performed by faculty and students. The theater seats 1,100 with a performance stage of 50 feet by 40 feet. The theater has separate men's and women's dressing/make-up rooms (30 feet by 40 feet) and contains restrooms and shower facilities. The theater also has four guest/star dressing rooms (15 feet by 20 feet).

Beginning to intermediate courses are offered in Ballet, Jazz, Tap and Contemporary

Dance Techniques with additional courses offered in Dance History, Injury Prevention, Stretch
and Relaxation, Musical Theater, Improvisation, Choreography and Dance Production.

Long Beach City offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU Long Beach, UC Santa Barbara and California Institute for the Arts.

Los Angeles Pierce College

Contact Persons: Marian Weiser, Dance Coordinator

Department Affiliation: Physical Education

The dance program is under the Physical Education Department and includes one full time faculty member, Marian Weiser and one adjunct faculty member, Jesusa Suzette Corby.

The program has one dance studio (40 feet by 60 feet) and one classroom (27 feet by 33 feet) which is used for Tap classes. These facilities are located in the Physical Education Building. Storage facilities consist of a storage shed (10 feet by 12 feet) located outside the dance studio and a wall of cabinets (approximately 44 feet by 10 feet) located in the dance studio. The office (7 feet by 10 feet) is located in the Physical Education building and is for all dance faculty.

The program presents two concerts. A Fall Ethnic/Folk Invitational Concert is presented in the theater and performed by professional ethnic dance companies or by a combination of guest artists and students. Spring Student Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed and performed by students. Auditions for this concert are open to all Pierce students. The theater seats 375 with a performance stage of 36 feet by 40 feet. It has one central make-up room (40 feet by 25 feet) with adjoining men's and women's dressing rooms, restrooms and shower facilities (approximately 12 feet by 20 feet).

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Ballet, Modern, Jazz, Tap and International Folk Dance with additional course offerings in Social Dance, Choreography and Dance Production.

The program has an active dance club and receives Associated Student funds which are used for concert production costs. The club's main responsibility is to help with all aspects of the dance concert from publicity, costuming, lighting and seating to the serving of refreshments.

Los Angeles Pierce offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU Long Beach, UCLA and California Institute for the Arts.

Los Angeles Trade-Technical College

Contact Person: Diane De Franco Browne, Dance Director

Department Affiliation: Physical Education

The dance program is under the Physical Education Department and includes one full time faculty member, Diane De Franco Browne and four adjunct faculty Danielle Brown, Tracy Douglas, Tracy Vonder Haar and Graciela Hinajosa Holguin.

The facilities consist of one dance studio (45 feet by 35 feet) and a classroom (40 feet by 30 feet) that is available for tap and lecture classes. The basement of the Physical Education building is used for costume storage. Dance faculty have two offices (12 feet by 16 feet) located in the Physical Education Building.

A Student Concert is presented in the fall and spring semesters. These concerts are presented in the theater, choreographed by faculty and students and performed by students. The theater seats 1500 with a performance stage of 26 feet by 35 feet. The dressing/make-up rooms are located downstairs with separate facilities (15 feet by 30 feet) for men and women. Restrooms are located upstairs off the backstage hallway. The performance group is involved in a pilot program to introduce dance into district K-12 schools. The performance group also performs at other community college concert.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Ballet, Modern and Jazz with additional courses offered in Tap, Polynesian Dance, Choreography and Dance Production. A special course, Methods of Dance training Skills, offers a job placement service for those students who qualify.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Los Angeles Trade-Tech does not offer a Dance Major or Certificate Program.

Miracosta College

Contact Person: Trisha Hanada-Rogers, Dance Coordinator Department Affiliation: Theater and Communications

The dance program at Miracosta College is under the Theater and Communications

Department and includes one full time faculty member, Trisha Hanada-Rogers and seven

adjunct faculty. The adjunct faculty are Wesley Acker, Yvonne Harguindeguy, Mark Hayes,

Holly Scheall, Anna Wilcoxson, Terry Wilson and Rachel VanDessell.

The program has two studios; one studio (60 feet by 50 feet) located on the Oceanside Campus (MiraCostas' main campus) and the second studio (40 feet by 40 feet) which is located on the San Elijo Campus (Miracostas' satellite campus). There are no specific storage facilities for dance at this time. The office (12 feet by 12 feet) is shared dance by all the dance faculty.

The program presents Studio Concerts in the fall and spring at the San Elijo Campus. The performance area (20 feet by 40 feet) is at one end of the studio and at the opposite end, pull-out bleachers provide seating for approximately 110 people. This presentation is choreographed and performed by students using works-in-progress, class progressions and completed choreographic dances. The Spring Student Concert is presented in the Oceanside

Campus Theater, choreographed by faculty and students; performed by students. The theater seats 250 with a performance stage of 40 feet by 30 feet. It has one central make-up room (20 feet by 20 feet). Adjoining at opposite ends are the men's and women's dressing rooms (20 feet by 20 feet) which contain restrooms and shower facilities.

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Ballet, Modern, Jazz and Tap with additional course offerings in Dance History, Alignment and Correctives, Choreography and Dance Production.

The program has an active Dance Club and is involved in fundrasing activities.

MiraCosta offers a Major in Dance from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU San Diego, CSU Long Beach and UC San Diego.

Moorpark College

Department Affiliation: Performing Arts

The dance program at Moorpark College is under the Performing Arts Department and includes one full time faculty member, Daniel Berney, and seven adjunct faculty. The adjunct faculty are Rene Baum, Avalon Garrett, Donald Hewitt, Margaret Hyun, Stella Matsuda, Sandra Patterson and Dennon Rawles.

The teaching facilities consist of two studios, the smaller (25 feet by 40 feet) is shared with Physical Education and the larger one (50 feet by 98 feet) is where the majority of dance classes are taught. The office (12 feet by 15 feet) is in the Performing Arts building.

The program presents a children's concert in December. This concert is a Christmas touring program which is produced, performed and choreographed by students. This touring production primarily visits Elementary Schools within the District and is presented as a free service to the community. A program of Works in Progress and Classroom Studies is presented

in the theater at the end of the Fall and Spring semester; performed by students. The Spring Student/Faculty Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed and performed by faculty, students and guest artists. The theater seats 450 with a performance stage of 50 feet by 35 feet. The facility has four dressing/make-up rooms; two small rooms are 9 feet by 12 feet while the two larger rooms are 18 feet by 30 feet. Restroom facilities are located off the backstage hallway.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Ballet, Modern, Jazz and Tap with additional offerings in Dance History, Composition, Choreography, Improvisation and Dance Performance/Production. Future curriculum development is being planned in the area of Ethnic Dance Forms.

The program has an active Dance Club and is involved in fundraising activities.

Moorpark offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, UCLA, California Institute for the Arts, UC Santa Barbara and CSU Long Beach.

Mt. San Antonio College

Contact Person: Jo Ella Lewis, Dance Department Chair Department Affiliation: Division of Physical Education

The dance program at Mt. San Antonio College is under the Division of Physical Education and includes two full time faculty members, Jo Ella Lewis and Karol Ritz. The adjunct faculty are Amy Bates, Rick Crawford, Jeff Hendrix, Patricia Lefler, Lee Martino and Nichole Walker.

The teaching facilities consist of three studios. Tap, Alignment & Correctives are taught in a studio (36 feet by 70 feet) which is located across campus. A separate women's locker room facility is attached to this studio. Two additional studios are located in the

Performing Arts Building; a small studio (46 feet by 54 feet) and a large studio (56 feet by 97 feet) which is also used as a studio theater. The office (12 feet by 22 feet) is located in the Performing Arts building directly adjacent to the studios and is for all dance faculty.

The program presents two concerts a year. The Fall Repertory Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed by faculty and guest artists; performed by Repertory company members. Spring Student Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed and performed by students. The theater seats 420 with a performance stage of 45 feet by 35 feet. It has 5 dressing/make-up rooms; three small rooms 7 feet by 12 feet while the two larger rooms are 18 feet by 36 feet. Restroom facilities are located off the backstage hallway. A program of Works in Progress and Classroom Studies is presented in the Studio Theater at the end of each semester. The Studio Theater seats 140 people and is equipped for full lighting capabilities.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Jazz, Ballet and Tap while only beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Modern. Additional courses are offered in Dance History, Introduction to Dance, Alignment and Correctives, Theater Dance, Choreography. Improvisation and Production/Performance. Future curriculum development is being planed in the areas of Ethnic Dance Forms and Dance Topics.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Mt. San Antonio does not offer a Dance Major or a Certificate Program.

Mt. San Jacinto College

The dance program is under the Division of Theater Arts and includes one full time faculty member, Gail Hoak and six adjunct faculty. The adjunct faculty are Tasha Dobbins, Gilda Gant, Mark Haines, Amelie Hunter, Kelly King and Paula Naggi-Liniger.

The teaching facility is located in the balcony of the gymnasium and consists of two studios; the smaller of which is 32 feet by 32 feet and the larger, 40 feet by 34 feet.

Storage Cabinets are located at the end of each studio approximately 24 feet by 4 feet. The office (12 feet by 12 feet) is located in the Theater complex and is for all dance faculty.

The dance program presents two concerts a year. Fall Studio Concert is presented in the studio theater, choreographed and performed by faculty and students. Spring Student/Faculty Concert is presented in the campus theater, choreographed and performed by faculty and students. The theater seats 385 and a performance stage of 36 feet by 20 feet. The facility has separate dressing/make-up rooms (18 feet by 12 feet) for men and women. Restroom/shower facilities are accessible from the dressing room areas and from the backstage hallway.

Beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Ballet, Modern and Jazz additional courses are offered in History of Dance in American Theater, Musical Theater Dance

Techniques, Rehearsal/Performance, Composition and Introduction and Appreciation of Dance.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Mt. San Jacinto offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, UC Riverside, CSU Long Beach and California Institute for the Arts.

Orange Coast College

The dance program at Orange Coast College is under the Physical Education

Department and includes three full time faculty Karen Shanley, Linda Sohl-Donnell and Jose

Costas. The adjunct faculty are Monie Adamson, Christine Baltes, Ramaa Bharadvaj, Marie De

La Palme, Pauline Hagino, Christy Wyant-Hernandez, Kathy Kahn, Lilia Llorens, Shana

Menaker, Angelika Nemeth, Damon Rago and Dennon Rawles.

The program has two dance studios, the larger of which is 60 feet by 40 feet and is also used to present informal dance productions. The smaller studio (22 feet by 35 feet), which has a raised wooden floor, was formerly the Gymnasium foyer. The office (18 feet by 15 feet) is located in the women's locker room facility directly across from the dance studio and is for all dance faculty.

The program presents two concerts and two Studio Hours during the year. A program of Works in Progress and Classroom Studies is presented during Studio Hours at the end of each semesters. It is presented in the theater and performed by students. The annual spring Student/Faculty Concert is presented in the theater and is choreographed and performed by faculty and students. The theater seats 1200 with a performance stage of 50 feet by 45 feet. The theater has separate men's and women's dressing/make-up rooms (24 feet by 18 feet) which contain shower and restroom facilities.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Modern, Ballet, Tap and Jazz with additional course offerings are in Ethnic Dance Forms, Appreciation of Dance, Corrective and Alignment.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Orange Coast offers a Major in Dance from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU Long Beach, California Institute for the Arts and UCLA. Two Certificate programs are offered; Dance Instructor and World Dance.

Palomar College

The dance program at Palomar College is under the Speech, Theater and Dance

Division and includes two full time faculty members Dorothie Bleth and Patriceanne Mead.

The adjunct faculty are Sue Gilson, Teresa Gomez, Tom Hanson, Julia Hilleary, Faith Jensen-Ismay, Eugenia Keefer, Currie Pederson, Don Piche and Trisha Trinh.

The teaching facilities are shared with Physical Education and Music. Two small studios are located in the Physical Education complex. The majority of dance classes are taught in a third studio located in the Music building (35 feet by 50 feet). The office (12 feet by 16 feet) and is for all the dance faculty.

The dance program presents four concerts a year. World Dance Celebration is presented in the theater performed by guest artists and the Palomar drum and dance group. Christmas Concert is presented in the theater, a combined production by dance, music and theater. Spring Student/Faculty Concert presented in the theater, choreographed and performed by faculty, students and guest artists. Student Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed by faculty and students and performed by students. The theater facility seats 399 with a performance stage of 50 feet by 35 feet. The theater has two separate men's and women's make/up rooms (20 feet by 15 feet) with adjoining dressing

rooms (15 feet by 12 feet). Restroom facilities are located between the make-up and dressing rooms with entrances from the backstage hallway or the make-up room.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Modern and Jazz with only beginning and intermediate courses offered in Ballet, Tap and Theater Dance. Additional courses offered in Creative Dance, Alignment and Correctives, Introduction to Dance History, and Ballroom. Future curriculum development is being planned in the areas of Ethnic Dance Forms and Dance Topics.

The program does not have an active dance club and not involved in fundraising activities.

Palomar offers a Major in Dance from which the majority of students transfer to CSU San Diego, UC San Diego, UCI and CSU Long Beach. Certificate program offered in Dance Specialist for Children.

Rio Hondo College

The dance program at Rio Hondo is under the Physical Education Division and includes one full time dance faculty member, Lauren Winslow-Kearns, whose position was established for the 1999-2000 academic year.

The teaching facility is one studio (35 feet by 40 feet) which is shared with Physical Education. The office (6 feet by 10 feet) is located in the Physical Education building for all dance faculty.

The program presents two performances a year. A program of Works in Progress and Classroom Studies is presented in the studio, performed by students. Spring Student/Faculty

Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed and performed by faculty, students and guest artists.

The new faculty member is currently evaluating curriculum, facilities, performance opportunities and future growth for the new program.

Riverside Community College

Department Affiliation: Performing Arts

The dance program at Riverside College is under the Performing Arts Department and includes two full time dance faculty members, Jo Dierdorff and Rita Chenoweth. The adjunct faculty are Mark Haines, Amelie Hunter, Leanne McGregor, Kathryn Scarano and Jeanna Selton.

The teaching and office facilities consist of three studios; the majority of classes are taught in main studio (30 feet by 60 feet) with an adjoining office (15 feet by 12 feet), which is for all dance faculty; an additional studio for classes in Correctives & Alignment (25 feet by 30 feet) and a small rehearsal studio (25 feet by 25 feet).

The dance program presents a studio concert in the fall and spring semesters, choreographed by faculty and students; performed by students. The studio has a seating capacity of approximately 100 with a performance area of approximately 30 feet by 25 feet. A Spring Student Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed by faculty and students; performed by students. Fall World Dance Festival is presented in the theater by students and guest ethnic groups. Kinetic Conversations Faculty Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed by faculty, performed by faculty and students. The theater seats 1,400 with a performance stage of 50 feet by 40 feet. The facility has two dressing/make-up rooms (20 feet by 40 feet) with restroom facilities off the back stage hallway.

Beginning to advanced courses are offered in Jazz and Modern while only beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Ballet and Tap. Additional courses are offered in Dance History, Conditioning for Dance, Choreography, Concert Dance Techniques, Hatha Yoga, Dance Performance, Introduction to Movement Education and Touring Ensemble. The Touring Ensemble consists of 10-20 dancers who build a repertory of various choreographic works in order to present mini-concerts, lecture-demonstrations, and master classes within the community and schools. A fee is negotiated for these performances with the funds received going into the dance budget.

The program has an active dance club which sponsors fundraising activities such as; raffles, selling stretch bands which are used for exercises requiring resistance, a high school dance day, dance tee-shirts and a Dance-A-Thon. All money received from these activities goes into the dance budget.

Riverside does not offer a Major in Dance or Certificate Program.

Saddleback College

The dance program at Saddleback College is under the Physical Education Department and includes one full time dance faculty member Dorothy Garant and five adjunct faculty.

The adjunct faculty are Victoria Barrett, Sharon Hass, Jeannine Kureger, Laura Lhotsky and Betty Sherrer.

The program has one dance studio (20 feet by 30 feet) and uses the gymnasium foyer for tap classes. A costume storage closet (4 feet by 8 feet) is located in the dance studio. The office (9 feet by 12 feet) is located in the Physical Education office complex and is for all dance faculty.

The dance program presents two performances a year; fall Faculty Concert is presented in the theater choreographed and performed by faculty and guest artists, spring Student Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed and performed by students. The theater seats 400 with a performance stage of 40 feet by 36 feet. The theater has a green room (15 feet by 20 feet) with separate men's and women's dressing/make-up rooms (20 feet by 25 feet). Restrooms and showers are available in each dressing room facility.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Ballet, Modern, Jazz and Tap.

Additional course offerings are Aerobic Dance, Exercise for Dancers, Rehearsal and

Performance, Dance Production and Choreography. Future curriculum development is being planned in the area of Ethnic Dance Forms.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Saddleback offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU Long Beach, UC Santa Barbara and California Institute for the Arts.

San Diego City College

The dance program at San Diego City College is under the Theater and Dance

Department and includes one full time dance faculty member Alicia Rincon and two adjunct
faculty, Teri Shipman and Terry Wilson.

The teaching facilities consist of one studio (35 feet by 50 feet). The office (6 feet by 6 feet) is located in the theater building.

The dance program presents two concerts; a program of Works in Progress and Classroom Studies is presented in the fall in the studio theater; performed by students.

Spring Faculty/Student Concert presented in the theater, choreographed and performed by faculty and students. The theater seats 300 with a performance stage of 35 feet by 30 feet. The facility has two separate men's and women's dressing/make-up rooms with restroom facilities located off the backstage hallway.

Beginning and Intermediate courses are offered in Jazz, Modern and Ballet, additional course offerings in Choreography, Dance Production and Dance Repertoire. Future curriculum development is begin planned in the areas of Ethnic Dance Forms and Dance History.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

San Diego City does not offer a Major in Dance or Certificate Program.

San Diego Mesa College

The dance program at San Diego Mesa College is under the Physical Education and Athletics Department and includes two full time dance faculty members Jan Ellis and Aulani Chun. The adjunct faculty are Angie Bunch, Donna Flournoy, Heidy Giersch-Schmidt, Colleen Shipkowski and Kelley Sullivan.

The teaching facilities are two studios (20 feet by 40 feet) with a storage room of 14 feet by 24 feet located adjacent to the studios. The faculty have two offices (7 feet by 12 feet) located in the Physical Education Building.

The dance program presents a Fall and Spring Student Concert in the Lyceum theater, choreographed and performed by faculty and students. Concerts are performed off campus at the Lyceum Theater due to the size and availability of the campus theater. The Lyceum

Theater seats 565 with a performance stage of 45 feet by 35 feet. The theater has two dressing/make-up room (24 feet by 18 feet) with restrooms and shower facilities located off the backstage hallway.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Ballet, Jazz and Modern with additional courses offered in Tap, Conditioning for Dancers and Athletes, Aerobics, Choreography, Dance Repertoire and Production. Future curriculum development is being planned in the areas of Dance History, Ethnic Dance Forms and Dance Topics.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

San Diego Mesa does not offer a Major in Dance or Certificate Programs.

Santa Ana College

The dance program at Santa Ana is under the Fine Arts Division and includes two full time dance faculty members Sylvia Turner and Eve Kikawa. The adjunct faculty are Tracy Douglas, Jeff Hendrix, Marjorie Himes, Graciela Holguin, Victoria Leonard, Katherine Steadman and Juan Talavera.

The teaching facilities consist of one dance studio (30 feet by 70 feet). A storage/music closet (12 feet by 12 feet) is located in the studio with an additional storage space of (12 feet by 12 feet) rented at an off campus storage facility. The office (10 feet by 12 feet) is located in the Technical Arts Building and is shared by all the dance faculty.

The dance program presents two concerts a year. Fall Student/Faculty Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed and performed by faculty, students and guest artists.

Spring Student Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed by faculty and students;

performed by students. The theater seats 250 with a performance stage of 40 feet by 30 feet. The facility has separate men's and women's dressing/make-up rooms (30 feet by 20 feet) with adjoining restrooms. The restrooms are also accessible from the hallway.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Ballet, Jazz, Modern while only beginning and intermediate courses are offered in Tap. Additional courses are offered in Dance History and Appreciation, Partnering, Dance Production, Repertory, Choreography, Basic Ballet for Older Adults, Conditioning for Dance Techniques and Women in the Arts.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Santa Ana offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to UCI, CSU Long Beach, CSU Fullerton and California Institute for the Arts. Certificate Program offered in Performance.

Santa Monica College

Department Affiliation: Theater Arts and Dance

The dance program at Santa Monica is under the Theater Arts and Dance Department and includes two full time dance faculty members Linda Gold and Judy Douglas. The adjunct faculty are Meri Bender, Reggie Brown, Suzanne Ecker, Kai Ganado, Karen Goodman, Benjamine Hernandez, Margaret Hills, Iris Pell, Charolette Richards, Caprice Walker, Loretta McCray and Ellen Sinatra.

The teaching facilities are two dance studios; a small room (35 feet by 22 feet) and a large room (40 feet by 40 feet). The studio stage theater is used as an alternate facility to teach the tap classes. Storage cabinets (30 feet by 6 feet) are located in the larger dance studio. The program has two offices (12 feet by 10 feet) located in the Theater Complex.

The program presents four concerts a year. Fall and Spring Student Concerts are presented in the studio stage theater, choreographed by faculty, students and guest artists; performed by students. The Mentor Program Concert is presented in the studio state theater, choreographed and performed by students in the Mentor Program. The Studio Stage Theater seats 100 with a performance stage of 35 feet by 28 feet. This facility has one make-up room (20 feet by 18 feet) with dressing/restroom areas located off the backstage hallway. A program of Works in Progress and Classroom studies is presented in the main theater at the end of each semester; performed by students. The main theater seats 315 with a performance stage of 35 feet by 30 feet and has a central dressing/make-up room (20 feet by 20 feet) with adjoining men's and women's restroom/shower. The restrooms are also accessible from the backstage hallway.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Jazz, Ballet, Modern and Tap.

Additional courses are offered in Dance History, Music for Dance and Creative Dance for Children. A special course, Dance in New York City, is offered during the interim session for travel and to study dance in New York.

The program does not have an active dance club and is not involved in fundraising activities.

Santa Monica does offer a Major in Dance from which the majority of students transfer to UCLA, UCI, CSU Long Beach and California Institute for the Arts.

Southwestern College

Department Affiliation: School of Arts & Communications

The dance program at Southwestern is under the School of Arts and Communication and includes one full time dance faculty member Mary Jo Horvath and six adjunct faculty.

The adjunct faculty are Rose Byadhy, Mary Beth Hughes, Martha Kenney-Jiacoletti, Emmalyne Moreno, Colleen Shipkowski and Debra Toth.

The teaching facility consists of one studio (40 feet by 60 feet) which can be divided into two by a sliding partition. The studio is also used as a performance facility for Studio Concerts. A stage area of 30 feet by 25 feet is located at one end of the studio, while pull-out bleachers at the other end seat approximately 120 people. A storage room of 8 feet by 24 feet is located in the dance studio. The office (8 feet by 12 feet) is located adjacent from the dance studio in the Physical Education building.

The program offers three concerts a year; a Fall Studio Concert presented in the studio theater, choreographed and performed by faculty, students and guest artists; Winter concert is presented in the studio theater, choreographed by faculty and performed by students; Spring Student Concert is presented in the theater, choreographed by faculty and students; performed by students. The theater seats 565 with a performance stage of 32 feet by 28 feet. The facility has separate men's and women's dressing/make-up rooms with adjoining restroom/shower facilities.

Beginning through advanced courses are offered in Jazz, Modern with additional courses offered in American Ballroom, Dance Rehearsal/Performance Workshop. Future curriculum development is being planned in the areas of Dance History and Ethnic Dance Forms.

Southwestern offers a Dance Tutoring Program for their students. This is the only college visited that offers this program. Tutors are taught all class dances (i.e. Jazz) and then tutoring sessions are offered for those students needing extra help and practice. Tutors are compensated through Work Study or other funds.

The program does not have a active dance club and is not involved in any fundrasing activities.

Southwestern offers a Dance Major from which the majority of students transfer to CSU San Diego, UC San Diego, UCI and CSU Long Beach.

SUMMARY

The time I spent visiting with other dance teachers, personally and professionally, was a rewarding and rejuvenating experience. Dance, like other performing arts, requires the majority of one's time to be spent on campus with rehearsals and the technical aspects of production in addition to numerous meetings with production staff. Therefore it is difficult to find time to visit other colleges in order to see what they are doing. This sabbatical allowed me time to exchange information, view selected dance concerts and evaluate Mt. San Antonio's dance program.

In my original proposal I had planned to send the Community College Dance Directory only to the community colleges involved. As the sabbatical progressed, it became apparent that four year institutions should also be included in this mailing as it will enhance the exchange of information between the two systems and assist in the communication process. This sabbatical has allowed me to officially address the issues regarding student transfer between the two systems at two major events, the American Dance Federation Conference and California Dance and Movement Workshop. It will now be addressed at a third major conference presented by the California Dance Education Association.

The community colleges and four year institutions are excited about the publication of the Dance Directory with its over-view of the different dance programs. The directory is also being studied by a dance director in Northern California as a networking source for the north. They have contacted me for my procedures regarding visitations and directory material. The professional organizations of CAHPERD (California Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance) and the California Dance and Movement Workshop for Educators have contacted me for a copy of the Dance Directory to use as a resource document.

I was pleased to find through visiting other dance programs that:

- Mt. San Antonio's dance curriculum needs little revision. In fact many of the schools visited are considering our curriculum when making their own revisions.
- Our Dance Department is looking forward to expanding curriculum by proposing several new courses:
 - Creative Dance For Children in collaboration with our Child Development Program.
 - Ethnic Dance Forms.
 - Topics in Dance.
- The Dance Department will develop two Mini Certificate Programs:
 - Teaching Emphasis for our students who work in studios and recreational programs.
 - Professional Emphasis for our students with professional careers.

In conclusion, this sabbatical was an excellent experience, providing me the opportunity to establish a networking system with other community colleges in Southern California and to establish dialogue with the four year institutions regarding our programs and concerns for the transfer student. I was especially pleased to find that our dance program at Mt. San Antonio College is highly respected within the dance community and that we are up to date in curriculum development. Our dance facilities are by far the most versatile and state of the art of any community college. Many colleges planning to have performing arts facilities in the future are looking at Mt. San Antonio College as the college to model.

I am especially indebted to the college and the Sabbatical Committee for this time of reflection and growth. I also wish to thank John Morton, the Division Dean of Physical Education for his support.







Dance Concert Visitations

I have selected to view the following colleges dance concerts.

Chaffey College/ Cabaret- November 7, 1998

Chaffey's dance program is shared with the Theater Arts Department. The performance schedule alternates with one year being a dance concert and the other a musical production; this year it was the musical production Cabaret. George Reeder, dance director, was the Director and Choreographer for this production. The production was presented with the audience sitting on stage in a cabaret setting. The dance segments were very simple but effective for the area in which they had to move. Chaffey's dance program has limited dance courses with the majority of them at the beginning level. This was evident with the choreography presented.

Santa Ana College - November 21, 1998

This production was choreographed by faculty and guest artists. The majority of the program was devoted to modern dance. Santa Ana has a strong program under the direction of Syliva Turner. I was interested to see this production because they had a guest artist in residence who was choreographing a work on the Santa Ana students in a two week period, which is very quick. It was the first time this was being done in a two week period. The concert was well rehearsed and performed. Sylvia was pleased with the student commitment and this new process but notes that it was just for this one special work. We may look into this for our Fall Repertory Company Concert as we currently invite guest artists to choreograph on the repertory company but the time line is much longer.

Glendale Community College - December 5, 1998

Glendale's performance facility for this faculty, student concert was the main dance studio. This facility was a gymnasium at one time and has been converted into a large movement studio and performance space. Glendale offers nine performances, the largest number by far of any other college. The program was mixed with modern, jazz and theater dance. Between each number a dancer comes out and tells you a little about the piece. The level of performing students was very mixed, well rehearsed and performed. Lynn McMurrey is a dance lighting designer for other dance companies and his lighting designs helped many of the dances; an enjoyable evening, even on bleachers, a bit too informal for me.

Riverside - Dances for Life Concert - January 30, 1999

Riverside produces "Dances for Life Concert" as part of their production schedule. This concert would be considered a professional concert as it is performed by guest artists and dance companies. The proceeds go the Inland A.I.D.S Project.

Orange Coast Community College - April 17, 1999

Orange Coast's student dance concert was excellent; well rehearsed, a variety of choreography and technically strong dancers.

Mt. San Jacinto College - April 23, 1999

This concert was performed by faculty and students it was devoted mostly to modern dance. Costuming and lighting design were lacking throughout the concert. The technique levels of the students were mixed, overall and the concert seem to need more rehearsals.

Santa Monica College - June 12, 1999

I was impressed with Linda Gold when I did my visitation and have heard about their program for years but have never had the opportunity to see a concert. This concert was choreographed by faculty, guest artists and students and performed by students; it was mixed in styles. The dancers were well rehearsed and talented, mixed in their technical abilities but good performers. The lighting design was similar in all the pieces which doesn't set the dances apart. The theater seemed in need of repair. The cyclorama as drooping, seatings had very little rake. I enjoyed the dancing but not the theater.

My main comment after visiting the various concerts is that we at Mt. SAC are so fortunate to have facilities like the Sophia B. Clarke Theater, Music Concert Hall and our dance studios. I appreciate the amount of talent and professionalism of the theater facilities team, which run our concert and the importance of bringing in a professional dance lighting designer for our dance venues.
