SUMMARY OF PLANNED AND ACTUAL ACTIVITIES

Three Parts of the Planned Activities:

- 1. Research and self-study of Revit / BIM (Building information Modeler)
- 2. Research and self-study of other digital multi-media resources min. 2 new software out of 5 names below:
 - Abobe "Photoshop"
 - Adobe "After-effect" and/or "Premiere"
 - "Sketch-Up"
 - "Camtasia"
 - "Blackboard" (Bb).
- 3. Research and self-study related to "World Architecture" with incidental travels.

Three Parts of the Actual Activities:

1. Research and self-study of "Revit" / BIM (Building information Modeler) and related software. This include the initial self-study of Revit 9 (2007 version available in 2006) and later Revit Architecture 2008.2 The self study include the study of available textbooks, articles, tutorials, web resources and the use of software in developing building-project demos. It also included the study and update of ADT (Architectural Desktop) 2007 and ACD-A 2008 (AutoCAD Architecture 2008).³ The co-existence and inter-relationship of these software "market leaders" make it necessary for us to continue to offer and to update with these "market leaders" because of the actual job market demand. I have done so by continue to use and stay with the latest versions of these noted "marketleaders"- including spending some of my time as publisher's "textbook reviewers" for textbooks for Architectural Desktop 2007 and AutoCAD Architecture 2008. I was prepared to (and starting Fall 2007, have already) included Revit 2008 with ACD-A 2008 in our Arch 18 course. While our official course outlines are software non-specific by design, such flexibility allow us to

² With the fast pace of technology improvements, it is a constant effort to stay current. New versions of software are very much like constantly moving targets. The study and the use/application of the software in developing teaching materials such as demo videos (of example building projects) had to be updated and/or adaptable as soon as Revit Architecture 2008 became available in 2007.

³ AutoCAD 2007, ACAD 2008, ADT-2007, ACD-A 2008 and their predecessor groups of software still take the largest market share in the design/construction industry and have been our main teaching software in our Arch 16, Arch 18, Arch 26 and related courses. As Revit is introduced into our program (in 2007), and gradually known to the industry as a whole, it will likely co-exist with AutoCAD, ADT/ACD-A for some years to come although it is anticipated that Revit will increase in importance and grow in market share in the architectural design and construction industry.

offer the most current technology as well as multiple software as we adjust to industry job-market demand and student interests. (Anticipated and/or current software used, however, are usually noted in the class schedule as an information item.) Please see "Further Report" section to follow for description on how demo videos are developed. Examples of currently available demo videos are listed in Appendix D, under each course of Blackboard's "Assignments" area where external links to video files (stored in web-server) are clicks away. In addition, included in Appendix E, are several sets of reduced/copied example portfolio pages showing student work and evidence of "Student Learning Outcome" from the Fall 2007 semester. (These portfolio pages are from students just completed my Arch 18 [Architectural CAD Elements], Arch 21 [Architectural Design II] and/or Arch 28 [Architectural Illustration and Animation] courses in Fall 2007.)


- a) The Arch-18 portfolio (of student Jose Gomez) 28 pages showing 3 architectural building projects completed in the course. The smallest project (Project 1)using primarily AutoCAD 2008, and the two larger projects (Project 2) using ACD-A-2008 and (Project 3) using Revit Architecture 2008, respectively.
- b) The Arch-28 portfolio (of student Jose Gomez) 5 pages of Illustrations of the "Revit" building project from Arch 18. (Said building project was also animated in this course using 3DS-Viz 2008.) ⁴

a) ⁴ The student animation videos are large in file sizes. They are available in the department server and may be included in the attached DVD if file size permits.)

- c) The Arch-28 portfolio (of student Max Lang) 5 pages of Illustrations of another "Revit" building. These pages were lay-out with the help of "photoshop" after architectural renderings were first produced in the course. (Said building project was also animated in this course.)
- d) The Arch-21 portfolio (of student Jean Pierre Cuba) 4 pages of Illustrations of Architectural Design Project 1 and 2 (using Revit-Architecture 2008 and 3DS-Viz 2008 and 3DS-Max.)
- e) Some other portfolio examples are included in the attached VCD/DVD when file-sizes permit. Due to file types and file size limitations, most student work examples are only saved on the department server. (Some student example files need special software to open.)

These student work examples show several students' integrated practical applications of Revit, 3DS-Viz, SketchUp, Photoshop, etc. in Architectural Design, Architectural Illustration and Animation. Some examples of lecture-demo videos of Revit projects are also included in <u>Appendix B</u> (A Supplemental Powerpoint Presentation of the Sabbatical Report with imbedded video clips.) and/or the attached VCD/DVD disk for reference.

- 2. Research and self-study of other digital multi-media resources (especially, but not limited to, "Camtasia" and "Blackboard" 2 out of the 5 software named in the original sabbatical plan) and used them for preparing classroom resources and demo videos so that our students can have 24/7 access through the web either before, during and/or after class lecture and/or lab time. (Please see further descriptions under the next "Further Report" section on how these materials are developed and examples of the developed resources in Appendix B, Appendix D, Appendix E and the attached DVD disk.) In addition, I also:
 - a) Participated during the 06-07 year in assist/teaching the basic
 "Blackboard" trainings for other faculty colleagues (after completing my own basic and advance trainings).
 - b) Used and practiced "Sketch-Up" and "Photoshop" (in addition to the Camtasia and Blackboard software particularly noted above). Although we do not officially teach these in our courses, these popular and practical software (named in the original five in the sabbatical plan) are widely available to our students and in the labs. They are widely used to produce architectural work in many of our courses, including (but not limited to) Arch-21 (Arch. Design II), Arch-28 (Arch. CAD Illustration and Animation), etc. which I also regularly teach.

3. Research and self-study related to "World Architecture" (new Arch 31 and 32 courses) -including 2 months of overseas travel (to Asia and Europe) visiting world architecture in addition to internet/library or other research/collections.

(Please see some example pictures included throughout this report and some example digital pictures I personally took included in the attached DVD disk. Due to large file sizes of high resolution pictures, the majority of pictures are stored in the department server only. Printed example pictures of digital resources obtained through web research are also included in Appendix F and Appendix H.)

FURTHER REPORT OF RESEARCH/STUDY ACTIVITIES

Further description of the three areas of research/study (including personal travel/study experience) corresponding to the sabbatical proposal follows:

1. Research/Study Project to learn "Revit", the new BIM (Building Information

Modeler) by Autodesk for incorporating Revit/BIM and RP (Rapid Prototyping)

in our curriculum

As planned for this activity, my research/study during the Fall 06- Spring 07 (and subsequent actual applications in courses) included (but not limited to) the following:

- Researched/studied <u>Revit 9</u> (2007 version) and the newer version of <u>Autodesk</u> <u>Revit Architecture 2008</u> (available in 2007) and related white papers on the subject.⁵ This included the study of textbook (Mastering Autodesk Revit Building by Aubin, 2006-Thomson Delmar Learning), tutorials and information related to BIM such as those available at www.autodesk.com/bim.
- Updated myself on AutoCAD (2007, 2008), new ACD-A-2008 (AutoCAD Architecture 2008), which is "Intelligent Object" based and an updated new version of ADT (Architectural Desktop) 2007.⁶ This group of software has been, and will remain competitive and viable in the industry and likely to co-exist with Revit for some years to come.

⁶ Before I started the sabbatical leave in Fall 2006, we used ADT-2006 (Architectural Desktop 2006) for our Arch 18 and Arch 26 – Architectural CAD courses.

- Acted as publisher's textbook reviewer of <u>Architectural Desktop 2007</u> and <u>AutoCAD Architecture 2008</u> (Goldberg 2008, Pearson Prentice Hall).
- Produced, updated (and uploaded to web-server for student 24/7 access) various demo videos of building project assignments using AutoCAD (various versions up to 2008), ADT (Architectural Desktop various versions up to 2007), ACD-A-2008 and Revit (up to 2008 version). Included/listed in Appendix B, Appendix D and attached DVD are many examples of Demo Videos on how to create building projects using Revit Architecture 2008. The procedures these videos are produced are:
 - a) After self-study, practice and familiarity of the (Revit/BIM) software during the sabbatical, I either pre-record, record live or after a lecture/demo/discussion, I will redo a demo for student memo/refresher. I use "Camtasia" as the media recorder for the "raw" recordings. (Please see Activity 2 below on "Camtasia"). The raw media recordings will show computer screen action and my voice as the instructor while the building elements are produced "live" using the (Revit/BIM) software.
 - b) The raw recording(s) are then edited (cut and/or spliced) and voice enhanced (often necessary) using "Camtasia" again as a video editor to produce satisfactory video in "Window-Media-Video" format (or ".wmv" files) suitable for our lab server and in class/lab access by students (for in-lab preview or review of a lesson-demo).
 - c) the ".wmv" video files are then also uploaded through FTP software to a department web server for later web-access. And,

- d) Exterior links in "Blackboard" are then set-up in the appropriate course content area (usually under "Assignment") with some written clarifications and notations. These one-click away web-links to video demos are identified with a "Globe or Earth" icon and then made available to the registered student's 24/7 access anywhere web access is available.
- We have been using ADT-2007 and ACD-A-2008 (available in 2007) in our Arch 18 and Arch 26 Architectural CAD courses. We have also (as planned) ⁷ phased in Revit 9 and Revit Architecture 2008 starting 2007. While there are many demo videos already produced (as described above) and currently available (see various Appendix), these videos are also constantly been updated and enhanced as updated software become available (and often as each-time a similar or related demo is made/given again). These demo-videos allow the students to either preview, review or repeat the software procedures which often take more than one-try to master. It also helps as a make-up lesson when a student misses a classdemo. Based on feed-backs from our students, they are quite impressed, and quickly got used to, the availability of these 24/7 supplemental digital resources through the internet via the "Blackboard" (see activity 2 below). The inclusion of Revit/BIM (with the other "market-leader" software) is important for our departmental programs at Mt. San Antonio College to continue at the forefront of technologies. (Please see Appendix E for example portfolios showing student

projects produced in Fall 2007 using AutoCAD 2008, ACD-A-2008 and Revit Architecture 2008.)

• In addition to using Revit 2008 in the Arch 18-Arch. CAD course, the practical use of the software are already been integrated into building projects across other courses. (Of course, this is currently only limited to more advanced students who enroll in, or have taken, multiple related courses such as Arch 18-Arch. CAD and Arch 28-Arch. Illustration and Animation; and/or Arch 18 and Arch 21- Arch. Design). Some of my students who learned Revit 2008 in Arch 18 have already used the software for creating Architectural Design Projects in Arch 21 and Architectural Illustration and Animation Projects in Arch 28. Such integrated student learning of software for practical architectural design project and design presentation across course "silos" are good examples and evidence of Student Learning Outcome.

2. Research/study project to learn at least two of the following other new software

(for incorporation into our programs for our students in design, presentation,
and preparation of portfolios or as general teaching/learning tools.):

- Abobe "Photoshop"
- Abobe "After-effect" and/or Abode "Premiere"
- "Sketch-up"
- "Camtasia"
- Bd (Blackboard Academic Suite),

I am happy to report that instead of two, I have studied at least 4 of the listed software, namely Photoshop, Sketch-up, Camtasia and Blackboard, especially "Camtasia" and Bd (Blackboard Academic Suite). I have been using Camtasia9 and Bb extensively to digitally record/edit/enhance teaching videos and set-up courses I am scheduled to teach (Arch 14, Arch 16, Arch 18, Arch 21 and Arch 28) on Blackboard for student access 24/7 through the internet. (Pleas see four step procedures - a), b), c), d) as described in the above activity 1.) Due to large file sizes, and limitation of printed report on digital video resources, I have included in the Appendix D samples of some of the Blackboard screens as seen by our students on the internet. 10 Although additional teaching/demo videos will be produced and/or refined weekly on an on-going basis, many videos have been produced and are currently already available in various courses through the Blackboard web links. 11 It must be noted that all Blackboard courses are still (and will always be) "work-inprogress". Additional contents are being developed and added weekly. All contents will also be continuously updated and/or improved.

⁹ Although there are only 5 or so licensed copies of Camtasia software in our department (primarily for faculty use in recording instructional demo videos), it is also very useful in student course work such as adding audio to enhance architectural walk-through and fly-around animation videos produced in my Arch 28- Arch. 3. Research and compilation of resources for our proposed new "World Architecture" courses Arch 31 and Arch 32 (recommended by our advisory committee). 12

As planned, (in addition to collecting digital resources) I personally visited and took first-hand digital photos of world architecture by traveling to Asia (Japan and China for the month of March 2007) and Europe (Portugal, England, Spain, France, etc. for the month of May 2007). Due to large number of digital photos taken, it is impossible to include them all in this written report. I have however, included some samples (with reduced resolution for small size photo prints) through out this report. The larger-file-sized (thus better resolution) digital photos are available through our departmental CAD lab server as additional resources for our World Architecture and other related design courses. (Over 1300 digital files of architectural pictures taken during the sabbatical period are also included in the attached DVD). In addition, other digital media resources other than first-hand pictures are also collected, such as (but not limited to) the following:

 An extensive DVD collection of world architecture started in our department during the year 2006 and 2007 (thanks to the generous special funding available to support my suggestions, selections and requests).


The original proposal noted that the resources may be researched through the internet and may include some incidental travel. The proposal was "to devote approximately "60% of a semester over the 2006-07 year to research, acquire and organize materials related to "World Architecture" including digital photos, slides, videos, drawings, sketches of significant architecture, either original site photos, drawings, sketches and/or other resources or information through the internet or published materials from libraries or other sources. Some incidental travel may be a part of this research and collection of new original digital photos and to add to my personal experiences of visiting significant architectural sites."



EXAMPLES OF DIGITAL RESOURCES ACQUIRED (2 OF 3)















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EXAMPLES OF DIGITAL RESOURCES ACQUIRED (3 OF 3)

CONCLUSIONS

Statement of Value and Benefits to the college:

The value and benefits of the sabbatical activities are multi-facetted and multi-folded:

- After winter 07 and Summer 07 trial runs, all courses I teach in 2007-08 are now enhanced with "Blackboard" resources –including (but not limited to) 24/7 internet accessible lecture-demo videos. Students love the accessibility and flexibility.
- As planned, we have been prepared and have already started incorporating BIM/Revit along with 3D Parametric and Intelligent Object based (2008 version) technologies into our courses starting 2007. This effort will continue to keep our program in the forefront of technology and our students competitive in the work-force.
- The integrated use of popular software (such as Sketch-up, Photoshop, Camtasia) with formally taught market-leaders (such as AutoCAD, ADT/ACD-A, Revit and 3DS-Viz) available in our lab across "course" silos are growing trend and indication of true "Student Learning Outcome" to be celebrated. Our students are more employable and successful when these up-to-date tools are comfortably used beyond course boundaries.



Proposed by Robert I. Ho, Chair of Architecture and Engineering Design Technology

(Description of Activities revised 1/15/2006)

Background Information

Since I joined the department in 1984, the department and the industry/profession have experienced revolutionary changes in the past two decades primarily due to the rapid changes in the use of technology, changes in industry/market demands, and the changes of our students (in terms of student compositions and student expectations). Reflecting these changes, the department name changed from Department of "Drafting" to "Drafting and Design" to "Drafting, Design and CADD", to "Architecture and Design", and finally to the current Department of "Architecture and Engineering Design Technology".

In response to these changes in technology, market and student expectations, the Mt. SAC's architectural technology and engineering design technology A.S. degrees and certificate programs evolved over the last two decades with major curriculum changes occurred in the late 1980's, late 1990's and currently in the mid 2000's.

In the mid 1980's, the first CADD (Computer Aided Design and Drafting) course in a small CAD lab equipped with 6 computers was offered in the department. By the late 1980's, the "ARCH" prefix replaced many of the "DRFT" courses. In addition, in keeping current with the industry demands and the technology of the time, one CADD course became required for our architectural technology certificate and A.S. degree programs.

Additional CAD courses were added in the late 1980's and 1990's in response to increased work-force demands for technology and CAD proficient para-professionals. CADD degree and certificate programs were also added. Due to capital budget limitations (and availability of faculty proficient and comfortable in technology), our 5 studio-classrooms gradually became 3 CAD labs (with 18 CAD stations each) and 3 traditional design studios. Reflecting our facilities, our courses as written in the official curriculum are now approximately 40% solely CAD/computer based, 40% traditional (manual) design studio based and 20% lecture based.

However, as our students becoming more and more technology accustomed, the market more and more technology essential and dependent, the integration of our technology/computer use with traditional (manual) design studio/lecture in all of our courses is becoming an inevitable trend – reflecting the now well-known fact of a standard architectural and engineering office work-station, i.e. each design/drawing station has a large design surface plus a computer loaded with several CAD, graphics and related software and internet connection. CAD and computer proficiency and daily usage are essential for 90% or more of the related jobs.

Due to rapid advances in CAD and multi-media software, the continuous need to keep current is essential for all faculty members in the department, especially those teaching CAD/multi-media based courses. Since I joined the department (as the first full-time licensed architect) in 1984, I have been teaching more CAD based courses (especially the more advanced architectural CAD) than any other faculty in the department. In addition, I also encourage students in non-CAD based courses to take advantage of technology whenever/wherever appropriate because I believe in the integrated use of all media/tools to get the job done.

The fact I teach more CAD courses happened partly by choice and partly by default. In general, it takes a faculty teaching CAD (especially more advanced course) a lot of extra time every year in order to keep current with software and related technology advances, I had to spend a lot of time (including summer, week-ends, etc.) for faculty training, self-study and attending workshops, seminars and conferences. Although I regularly participate in more faculty software training and attend more technology seminars and conferences than other faculty, I find it hard to truly keep-up with the moving target of technology progresses and software advancements, especially major revolutionary jumps.

To keep the department's programs in the fore-front of technology developments and to better serve our student's learning, I am proposing the following sabbatical activities.

<u>Description of Proposed Sabbatical Activities</u> - The three self research/study projects described below will be conducted over the 2 semesters of Fall 06 - Spring 07, using approximately 1/3 each of the equivalent full-time academic year. (If this proposal is approved, I plan to also apply 6 LHE or 20% full-load of previously banked leave time to make up the equivalent of a year's full-time salary.)

- A. Research/Study Project to learn "Revit", the new BIM (Building Information Modeler) by Autodesk for incorporating Revit/BIM and RP (Rapid Prototyping) in our curriculum (I plan to devote approximately 1/3 time of the Fall 06- Spring 07 semesters for this research-study activities.)
 - What and Why "Revit" is the new parametric Architectural BIM software highly promoted by the world's dominant CAD software company "Autodesk". Since the late 1980's, ACAD (also by Autodesk) has been used by most design firms as the standard production drawing tool (primarily 2D). ACAD has since been the industry dominant CAD software in architecture, engineering and construction. Parametric BIM and RP (Rapid Prototyping) today (since the early 2000's) appear to be very much like ACAD was in the late 1980's and early 1990's. Revit and ADT (Architectural Desktop, which we currently use and teach, also by Autodesk) appear to be poised to become the next architectural and construction industry standard in the near future.
 - How -Methods of the research and self-study of Revit/BIM will include attending conferences and teacher trainings (when available). In addition, I plan to learn and apply the new software by doing tutorials as well as devising student assignments, projects and demos using the software. Related to this activity, I plan to also further incorporate our newly acquired RP (Rapid Prototype)/3D printing capabilities into our courses with this research study.

- Results of the research/study knowledge and resource materials will be developed so that at least one section of Arch 18 (Architectural CAD Elements - our intermediate level 3D CAD course) may be offered based on Revit or using Revit as alternate software starting 2007-08 year. In addition, RP/3D printing will be further integrated into teaching modules in appropriate sections of our courses (such as Arch 18/26/26 - Arch CAD Elements, CAD Working Drawings, Architectural Illustration and Animation). Since the early 1990's, our intermediate architectural CAD courses (currently Arch 18 and 26) have always stayed current with new technology by using Autodesk's ADT (Architectural Desktop) software (and its predecessors of industry standard ACAD add-on versions such as AEC-Architectural, ASG, Softdesk, etc.). From various conferences and professional reports, BIM based on 3D parametric CAD and RP/3D printing are quickly becoming the next major technology-driven advances in the architectural and construction industry since the over-whelming adoption of (basic) CAD in the 1980-90's. It appears to be the right time for us to take these needed steps to stay at the forefront of technology and include Revit – BIM and RP/3D printing in our (future) course offerings.
- Special Note: The research-study on Revit BIM stated above will be conducted in addition to continued regular efforts devoted to keep-up with software series we currently and will continue to teach, such as <u>ACAD</u> (<u>AutoCAD</u>) 2006 (2007 or most current version when available), <u>ADT-Architectural Desktop</u> 2006 (2007 or most current version when available), <u>3D</u> <u>Studio Viz</u> (2006, 2007 or most current version), <u>3D Studio Max 7</u> (or most current version), <u>PowerPoint</u>, etc.
- B. Research/study project to learn at least two of the following other new software for incorporation into our programs for our students in design, presentation, preparation of portfolios or as general teaching/learning tools. I estimate devoting approximately 1/3 time over the Fall 06 Spring 07 year for this activity. These following listed software are either currently available to our students in our labs or could be purchased/installed in our labs in the future):
 - Abobe "Photoshop" currently installed in some of our lab computers (but not "taught" in courses), useful for architectural presentation, illustrations, design and portfolio preparation. (Arch 10, 13, 21, 23, 27, 28 and 29)
 - Abobe "After-effect" and/or Abode "Premiere", useful for editing and postproduction of animation video produced from architectural walk-through and fly-through in Arch 28 and EDT 28 (not currently available in our labs).
 - "Sketch-up", which is available free to our students (to install in their own computers for educational purpose when officially registered through faculty license) a major advantage over all other software we officially teach and use in the labs (none of them free for students to install at their own computers). Sketch-up appears to be lighter, easier to learn but quite useful in many of our courses, such as Arch 10, Arch 13, Arch 21, 23 and portfolio preparations, etc.
 - "Camtasia", which we do not "teach". It is our newly acquired video recording software used to record our CAD lecture/demos for student reference and as a learning-assistance tool. We have been using a similar "Camstudio" in the last

- couple of years with some success. Camtasia appears to be more capable than Camstudio. I would like to devote some time to learn the many features of Camtasia to take full advantage of this teaching tool.
- **Bd (Black-board)**, a known teaching tool recently selected as a campus standard for Mt. SAC for distance learning, hybrid or standard offering courses.
- C. Research and compilation of resources for our proposed new "World Architecture" courses Arch 31 and Arch 32 (recommended by our advisory committee) and/or materials for a similar titled book I plan to devote approximately 60% of a semester over the 2006-07 year to research, acquire and organize materials related to "World Architecture" including digital photos, slides, videos, drawings, sketches of significant architecture, either original site photos, drawings, sketches and/or other resources or information through the internet or published materials from libraries or other sources. Some incidental travel may be a part of this research and collection of new original digital photos and to add to my personal experiences of visiting significant architectural sites. The materials generated may be a resource for the newly proposed "World Architecture" courses, a base for a future book (not a part of this sabbatical) and/or a general reference and resources for our various architectural design and related courses. Visiting significant architecture has always been an inspirational experience good for personal recharge and growth, especially for the architectural profession.

Anticipated Value and Benefit of the Proposed Sabbatical Activities to the Applicant, the Department and the College:


- A. Incorporation of the new BIM (Building Information Modeling) and 3D parametric technology into our architectural curriculum starting 2007-08 year keeping Mt. SAC's architectural program in the forefront of technology which is essential for our students to be competitive in the work-force.
- B. Potentially offering the newly proposed "World Architecture" courses (in response to Advisory Committee recommendation) with enhanced supporting resources to round-off our architectural (transfer) curriculum and/or to meet the general education interests of Mt. SAC students.
- C. Instead of barely keeping up with the moving target of rapid technology changes, finally having a year's time (fall and spring semesters in 2006-07) to get to the forefront of pertinent technologies.
- D. Personally refreshed and updated as a teaching faculty. And in addition, spread the information, experience and enthusiasm to other faculty members.

10 Wonders of the New China

It's a hotbed of innovative architecture, from diaphanous theaters to buildings heated and cooled by water



China's current building boom is doing more than sucking up the world's supply of steel — it's creating a stage for some of today's boldest architecture and engineering. Take a tour of the 10 of the most intriguing examples.

1. The Commune, Beijing

First phase completed 2002, expansion scheduled for completion in 2010





Ho-Sabbatical-Report-2007-9 Ho-Sabbatical-Report-2007-12-31 (Revised 12/2007) Even if the Commune didn't sit beside that wonder of the ancient world, the Great Wall of China, it would still qualify as a wonder. The complex includes houses by 12 of Asia's leading architects. It was conceived by married real-estate developers Zhang Xin and Pan Shiyi, who gave each architect a \$1 million budget. Shigeru Ban, the Japanese architect most famous for the paper houses he designed for refugees of the Kobe earthquake, designed the Furniture House, featuring the laminated plywood typically used for modular furniture, and China's Yung Ho Chang created the Split House, which takes the idea of a boxy dwelling, slices it in half, and spreads it out like a fan.

The Commune is now operated as a boutique hotel by the Germany luxury hotel group Kempinski, which is responsible for an upcoming expansion, which will feature 21 homes (including replications of the originals). One element will remain untouched in the new development: the Commune's private pedestrian trails, which trace untouched sections of the Great Wall.

2. Beijing International Airport, Beijing

Foster & Partners. Under construction, to be completed in late 2007




According to the U.S. Embassy to China, the country will be building 108 new airports between 2004 and 2009 -- including what will be the world's largest: the Beijing International Airport, designed by Foster & Partners. Set to open at the end of 2007, in time for the Beijing Olympics in 2008, the airport terminal will cover more than 1 million square meters, giving it a bigger footprint than the Pentagon.

It's designed to handle 43 million passengers a year initially and 55 million by 2015, figures that will probably push the new facility into the ranks of the top 10 busiest airports, going by the 2004 numbers from the Airports Council International. Given the scale and traffic, Foster & Partners focused on the traveler's experience, making sure that walking distances are short, for instance.

Building on Foster's experience designing Hong Kong's new mega-airport, the massive Chek Lap Kok, the sprawling Beijing terminal is housed under a single roof. To help passengers distinguish between different sections of the vast space, skylights cast different shades of yellow and red light across walls -- a subtle but innovative navigational aid. The architects also kept sustainability in mind: An environmental-control system reduces carbon emissions, and skylights situated on a south-east axis lessen solar heat, keeping the building cool.

`3. Shanghai World Financial Center, Shanghai

Kohn Pedersen Fox Architects. Under construction, completion scheduled for 2008



Rising in the Lujiazhui financial district in Pudong, the Shanghai World Financial Center is a tower among towers. The elegant 101-story skyscraper will be (for a moment, at least) the world's tallest when completed in early 2008.

One of the biggest challenges of building tall is creating a structure that can withstand high winds. The architects devised an innovation solution to alleviate wind pressure by adding a rectangular cut-out at the building's apex. Not only does the open area help reduce the building's sway but it also will be home to the world's highest outdoor observation deck — a 100th-floor vista that will take vertigo to new heights.

4. National Swimming Center, Beijing

PTW and Ove Arup. Under construction, completion scheduled for 2008




The striking exterior of the National Swimming Center, being constructed for the 2008 Olympic Games and nicknamed, the "Water Cube," is made from panels of a lightweight form of Teflon that transforms the building into an energy-efficient greenhouse-like environment. Solar energy will also be used to heat the swimming pools, which are designed to reuse double-filtered, backwashed pool water that's usually dumped as waste.

Excess rainwater will also be collected and stored in subterranean tanks and used to fill the pools. The complex engineering system of curvy steel frames that form the structure of the bubble-like skin are based on research into the structural properties of soap bubbles by two physicists at Dublin's Trinity College. The unique structure is designed to help the building withstand nearly any seismic disruptions.

5. Central Chinese Television CCTV, Beijing

OMA/Ole Scheeren and Rem Koolhaas. Under construction, scheduled for completion in 2008

The design of the new Central Chinese Television (CCTV) headquarters defies the popular conception of a skyscraper — and it broke Beijing's building codes and required approval by a special review panel. The standard systems for engineering gravity and lateral loads in buildings didn't apply to the CCTV building, which is formed by two leaning towers, each bent 90 degrees at the top and bottom to form a continuous loop.

The engineer's solution is to create a structural "tube" of diagonal supports. The irregular pattern of this "diagrid" system reflects the distribution of forces across the tube's surface. Designed by Rem Koolhaas and Ole Scheeren and engineered by Ove Arup, the new CCTV tower rethinks what a skyscraper can be.

6. Linked Hybrid, Beijing

Steven Holl Architects; Li Hu, lead architect. Groundbreaking on December 28, 2005, scheduled for completion in 2008



Linked Hybrid, which will house 2,500 people in 700 apartments covering 1.6 million square feet, is a model for large-scale sustainable residential architecture. The site will feature one of the world's largest geothermal cooling and heating systems, which will stabilize the temperature within the complex of eight buildings, all linked at the 20th floor by a "ring" of service establishments, like cafés and dry cleaners. A set of dual pipes pumps water from 100 meters below ground, circulating the liquid between the buildings' concrete floors.

The result: The water-circulation system serves as a giant radiator in the winter and cooling system in the summer. It has no boilers to supply heat, no electric air conditioners to supply cool. The apartments also feature gray-water recycling — a process that's just starting to catch on in Beijing in much smaller buildings — to filter waste water from kitchen sinks and wash basins back into toilets.

7. Dongtan Eco City, Dongtan

Masterplan by Arup, for the Shanghai Industrial Investment Corp. In planning stages, first phase to be completed in 2010



Developed by the Shanghai Industrial investment Corp., Dongtan Eco City, roughly the size of Manhattan, will be the world's first fully sustainable cosmopolis when completed in 2040. Like Manhattan, it's situated on an island — the third-largest in China. Located on the Yangtze River, Dongtan is within close proximity of the bustle of Shanghai.

By the time the Shanghai Expo trade fair opens in 2010, the city's first phase should be completed, and 50,000 residents will call Dongtan home-sweet-sustainable-home. The goals to be accomplished in the next five years: systems for water purification, waste management, and renewable energy. An infrastructure of roads will connect the former agricultural land with Shanghai.

8. Olympic Stadium, Beijing

Herzog & de Meuron. Under construction, to be completed in 2008

Sports stadiums have long followed the enduring design of one of the original wonders of the world, Rome's Coliseum. Herzog & de Meuron's National Stadium in Beijing is an attempt to rethink the classic sports-arena layout for more ecologically correct times.

The Swiss architects (of Tate Modern fame) wanted to provide natural ventilation for the 91,000-seat structure -- perhaps the largest "eco-friendly" sports stadium designed to date. To achieve this, they set out to create a building that could function without a strictly enclosed shell, yet also provide constant shelter for the audience and athletes alike.

To solve these design problems, they looked to nature for inspiration. The stadium's outer grid resembles a bird's nest constructed of delicately placed branches and twigs. Each discrete space within the facility, from restrooms to restaurants, is constructed as an independent unit within the outer lattice -- making it possible to encase the entire complex with an open grid that allows for natural air circulation. The architects also incorporated a layer of translucent membrane to fill any gaps in the lacy exterior.

9. Donghai Bridge, Shanghai/Yangshan Island

China Zhongtie Major Bridge Engineering Group, Shanghai # 2 Engineering Co., Shanghai Urban Construction Group. Officially opened in December, 2005



Ho-Sabbatical-Report-2007-9 Ho-Sabbatical-Report-2007-12-31 (Revised 12/2007)

A key phase in the development of the world's largest deep-sea port was completed when China's first cross-sea bridge — the 20-mile, six-lane Donghai Bridge — was officially opened in December, 2005. Stretching across the East China Sea, the graceful cable-stay structure connects Shanghai to Yangshan Island, set to become China's first free-trade port (and the world's largest container port) upon its completion in 2010.

To provide a safer driving route in the typhoons and high waves known to hit the region, Donghai Bridge is designed in an S-shape. The structure, reported by *Shanghai Daily* to have cost \$1.2 billion, will hold its title of China's — and one of the world's — longest over-sea bridge for only a couple of years, though. In 2008, the nearby 22-mile Hangzhou Bay Transoceanic Bridge, which also begins (or ends, depending on your journey) in Shanghai, will earn the superlative.

10. National Grand Theater, Beijing

Paul Andreu and ADP. Under construction, to be completed in 2008

Located near Tiananmen Square, the 490,485-square-foot glass-and-titanium National Grand Theater, scheduled to open in 2008, seems to float above a man-made lake. Intended to stand out amid the Chinese capital's bustling streets and ancient buildings, the structure has garnered criticism among Bejing's citizens for clashing with classic landmarks like the Monument to the People's Heroes (dedicated to revolutionary martyrs), the vast home of the National People's Congress, or Tiananmen Gate itself (the Gate of Heavenly Peace).

French architect Paul Andreu is no stranger to controversy — or to innovative forms. A generation ago, in 1974, his untraditional design for Terminal 1 of Paris's Charles de Gaulle airport was criticized for its unusual curves, yet Andreu's groundbreaking, futuristic building later was seen to distinguish de Gaulle from more generic European and international air hubs. (The same airport's Terminal 2E, also designed by Andreu, gained attention in 2004 when it collapsed, tragically killing four people.)

Beijing's daring National Grand Theater is as much a spectacle as the productions that will be staged inside in the 2,416-seat opera house, the 2,017-seat concert hall, and the 1,040-seat theater. At night, the semi-transparent skin will give passersby a glimpse at the performance inside one of three auditoriums, a feature that highlights the building's public nature.

Revit Interoperability with CAD

Revit Interoperability with CAD

Autodesk® Revit® is a complete architectural design and documentation solution, supporting all phases of design and all architectural drawings and schedules required for a building project. From massing and conceptual studies through the most detailed construction drawings and schedules, Autodesk Revit has tools for delivering productivity, coordination, and quality to the building team.

Autodesk Revit can be used alone or in conjunction with AutoCAD[®]. This guide will help those who are familiar with AutoCAD to understand how Autodesk Revit works, introducing some of the main features and concepts of Autodesk Revit and comparing them with similar features of AutoCAD.

This guide also demonstrates how you can use Autodesk Revit with AutoCAD to manage a project and its deliverables. You'll learn how to integrate existing AutoCAD projects with Autodesk Revit to produce construction documents. The process relies on the export compatibility of Autodesk Revit and the external referencing capabilities of AutoCAD.

Autodesk Revit provides DWG compatibility using the Autodesk ObjectDBX $^{\text{\tiny{TM}}}$ toolkit, and works with AutoCAD to ensure clear communication of design data among project teams.

Features of Autodesk Revit

True 3D Design

Using Autodesk Revit, you work with architectural models rather than geometry. With Autodesk Revit, you can switch among views and schedules as you like. Because you create a parametric building model, dependencies are automatically updated as you make changes.

Parametric Objects

Autodesk Revit contains 3D parametric building elements, which carry information about their relationships to other objects in the building, in contrast with the blocks and solids used in AutoCAD. For example, in Autodesk Revit, the properties of a wall can state that it should rise to the next level or roof. After you specify this property, the wall retains its relationship to the next level or roof regardless of other changes you may make in the building.

Dimensions correspond to the actual size of building elements. Updating a dimension updates the parametric components and their relationships to other components. Locking a dimension allows you to embed your design intent. After a dimension is locked, the dimensioned relationship is maintained. Dimensions in schedules behave in the same way: if you change width and height values in a schedule, the revised size is reflected in the elements of the model. Coordination of dimensions and graphics is assured throughout the project.

Families vs. Blocks

AutoCAD users are accustomed to storing symbols in individual DWG files. With Autodesk Revit, you store similar parametric components in family files. Family files can contain many styles of components, providing easy organization and data sharing, and offer numerous placement options. You can customize family files; for example, you can modify alignment planes or add subcategories to objects. You can also create intelligent parametric objects or customize the ones included with Autodesk Revit.

Alignment vs. Osnaps

Autodesk Revit offers sketching tools such as temporary dimensions and alignment guides. Alignment guides are similar to the object snap features in AutoCAD. Temporary line and arc extensions, and snap points relative to your current position, aid you as you design. With Autodesk Revit, you can place components and modify the design later. Doors open in the desired direction and windows are placed at the correct height on the wall. You can place components in either two-dimensional (2D) or three-dimensional (3D) views.

Multiple Design Views

With Autodesk Revit you can work with components in any view, including schedules. Multiple views can be open at the same time, and changes made in one view are immediately updated in the others, making Autodesk Revit a valuable tool for experimenting with design changes. You can open plan and 3D views side by side, so that you can verify whether modifying a component on one level interferes with any design intent on another level.

No Command Line or Layers

AutoCAD users will notice the absence of a command line and the layer control feature. In Autodesk Revit, building tools and components are presented on a Design Bar. The software is designed to look and work like other familiar Microsoft[®] Windows[®] applications. Visibility of components is controlled through the Visibility/Graphic Overrides feature, which works on a per-view basis (comparable to the AutoCAD Freeze/Thaw by viewport feature). Color and linetype are also controlled by category. The display of components depends on the view in which they are seen. For example, components display only a footprint in plan view, while displaying all geometry in a 3D isometric view.

Single File, Multi-User Projects

In Autodesk Revit, project data is stored in a single file, eliminating the need to work with external blocks and xrefs. Architects work in teams, with each assigned a specific functional area. This involves simultaneously working on and saving different portions of the project. Autodesk Revit projects can be subdivided into worksets. A workset is a collection of elements in the building that can be edited by one architect at a time

Parametric Relationships

By using the dimensioning and alignment locking features in Autodesk Revit, you can place building components in relation to others and keep them that way throughout the design. You can lock components together in more than one place to preserve wall alignments, room areas, or door and window placements, even as the model is being altered in other areas. Component relationships may be constrained or overridden at your discretion. Dimensions may be locked or editable while the parent objects behave accordingly. Because objects can be aligned and locked into place, repetitive editing commands are eliminated, allowing for faster work and fewer errors.

Read/Write DWG

Autodesk Revit provides DWG compatibility using the Autodesk ObjectDBXTM toolkit. You can import and export models to DXF TM and DWG formats. When exporting, Autodesk Revit matches its components and their subcategories from the current view to AIA or user-defined layer names. You can also import these formats into 2D or 3D views, allowing for smooth coordination and exchange of information among team members.

Producing Paper Drawings

All drawings are produced from the single parametric building model used to create the design. Any changes to the design are updated in the drawing sheet views. Changes to elevations, sections, and callouts are immediately updated in all reflected views. Any view that you create can be added to a sheet and scaled. After you place the drawing on a sheet, you can perform last-minute placements just as easily in a sheet view as in a model view. Scale-dependent line weight and scale-independent annotation size allow you to reuse information in views without complex reformatting. The WYSIWYG display lets you see the final result before output, reducing plotting errors. Plotter hardware support in Autodesk Revit is limited only by the operating system. Autodesk Revit can use any Microsoft[®] Windows[®] driver available for your plotter.

Using Autodesk Revit with AutoCAD

Here are the basic steps for using an Autodesk Revit project with AutoCAD:

- 1. Create the building model in Autodesk Revit.
- 2. Set up sheets for the project in Autodesk Revit.
- 3. Export selected views or sheets to DXF/DWG format for AutoCAD users.
- 4. Annotate the exported DXF/DWG files in AutoCAD by referencing the files.
- 5. Link any data created externally into Autodesk Revit as external reference files to keep data consistent.

Following is a workflow summary of tasks you'll perform as you work through a project using Autodesk Revit and AutoCAD:



At Project Startup

- Set up the project in Autodesk Revit.
- Create any necessary building scale views.
- Define appropriate worksets.
- Begin modeling the building.
- Set up preliminary sheets in Autodesk Revit.

During Design Phases

- Create any necessary enlarged scale views.
- Continue modeling the building.

- Create a "cartoon set" of sheets in Autodesk Revit.
- Set up folders for linked files to be exported to AutoCAD.

At Start of Construction Documents

- Create any necessary detail views.
- Begin detailing the building.
- Determine what details to reuse from an existing library.
- Revise the cartoon set of sheets to include any additional sheets.
- Create a list of sheets to be worked on in AutoCAD.
- Export this list of sheets.
- Link any AutoCAD data into the appropriate Autodesk Revit views.

At Conclusion of Construction Documents

Archive the files created.

Preparing for Data Export


When preparing to export an Autodesk Revit model, you need to consider export methods, file naming conventions, data export options, and layering standards.

Exporting Views or Sheets

You can export either views or sheets, depending on the scope of work to be done in AutoCAD, as well as the progress of construction documentation in Autodesk Revit.

Exporting a view creates a DWG or DXF file of the currently selected Autodesk Revit view. All external data linked to the view will be embedded as a block in DWG or DXF format. Use this method when you intend to annotate only selected views in AutoCAD.

Exporting an entire sheet from Autodesk Revit produces a set of DWG or DXF files. One file contains sheet information (borders, title block) with a viewport for each view. Each Autodesk Revit view becomes an individual file referenced into the sheet file and displayed in the appropriate viewport. All files are located in the same directory to facilitate tracking and management.



Naming Conventions

To keep file names consistent throughout the project, use the Autodesk Revit default naming convention, as shown here:

Exported Sheets

[Project Filename]-[View Category]-[Sheet Number]-[Sheet Name]. [Extension]

Exported Views (on sheets)

[Project Filename]-[Extension]-[View Category]-[Sheet Number]-[Sheet Name]--[View Identifier].[Extension]


- Project Filename: Name of the Autodesk Revit file
- Extension: Standard Autodesk Revit file extension (rvt, rft, rfa), depending on the file open in Autodesk Revit
- View Category: Floor Plan, 3D View, Elevation, Section, Drafting View, or Drawing Sheet
- Sheet Number: Standard sheet number
- Sheet Name: Standard sheet name
- View Identifier: Standard view name
- Extension: Exported DWG or DXF, depending on user selection

Data Export Options

The following options are available in the Export dialog box:


Export Range: Select either the current view or a set of views/sheets. The latter facilitates a batch-like export of a range of views.

Export Layers File: The file displayed by default is the current export layer standard. You can select a different export standard if you wish.



Layering Standards

In the Export Layers dialog box, categories and subcategories of Autodesk Revit host components are mapped to a layer name and color number for use in a DWG or DXF file, using settings specified in special text files in the Revit\Data directory. By default, Autodesk Revit uses the last-specified export layer standard. The software supplies files for the AIA, BS1192, ISO 13567, and CP 83 standards. You can select from these or create custom standards.



You can incorporate custom office-dependent layering standards into the workflow and apply them to external files. This helps to ensure data consistency within a multi-platform environment.

Drafting in AutoCAD

The following techniques will facilitate a smooth workflow in a multi-platform project environment.

Linking Files

Rather than drafting directly in DWG or DXF files exported from Autodesk Revit, you should use the AutoCAD external reference (xref) functionality. Open an empty drawing in AutoCAD and, using the Xref Manager, attach the exported Autodesk Revit view as an Overlay for Reference Type.

Referencing Views and External Data

Because Autodesk Revit does not require the use of coordinates, the guidelines given here ensure precise alignment between externally created data and the building model. These methods prevent offsets from occurring when exported DWG or DXF data is referenced into AutoCAD, as well as when externally created data is re-imported into Autodesk Revit.

In AutoCAD, use 0,0,0 as the insertion point when using xrefs. Do not change the insertion point to Specify On-screen. Specifying a user coordinate system or using wblocks can introduce new origins and offsets when re-importing AutoCAD data into Autodesk Revit.

Try to maintain a form of visual proof or a reference point for externally created data. Building features often give the best visual feedback to ensure precise alignment. You might also locate points or other reference marks at grid intersections.

Externally created data can be aligned precisely using the Autodesk Revit snapping, alignment, and locking functions.

Naming Drawings

Using the default Autodesk Revit naming convention is highly recommended. For more information, see "Naming Conventions" on page 4.

If new drawings created outside Autodesk Revit use data exported from Revit as the external reference, appropriate file names are required. Use the name of the existing DWG or DXF file and add a prefix or suffix to create the new file name.

For example, a drawing might use the following file as an external reference:

Hotel ProdEx-MT Copy-rvt-Floor Plan-Level 16-Mechanical.dwg

When the drawing is re-imported into the Autodesk Revit view 'Level 16 - Mechanical,' it could have this name:

Hotel ProdEx-MT Copy-rvt-Floor Plan-Level 16-Mechanical-ANNO.dwg

Referencing Data into Autodesk Revit

Finally, data created in the external system is referenced into Autodesk Revit to ensure consistency throughout the design and documentation phases.


Preparing for Referencing

In AutoCAD, unload the external references that were exported from Autodesk Revit to avoid redundant display of information (unless such display is desired for temporary referencing purposes).

File Linking Options

On the Autodesk Revit File menu, click Import/Link ➤ DWG, DXF, DGN to bring in external data.

The Import/Link dialog box in Autodesk Revit offers options for linking a document created externally.



Import or Link

You can reference DWG or DXF data created in AutoCAD into the current Autodesk Revit project.

- Link (instead of import): Select Link if you want data to automatically update when the external file is changed.
- Current view only: Select Current view only to ensure linked files are visible only in the current view. It also ensures correct display of annotations and dimensions.


Scaling

In most cases, use Auto-Detect to generate correct scaling of linked data.


Layer/Level Colors

These three options control the appearance of the file linked into Autodesk Revit.


■ Black and White: Ignores color information in the external file and displays linked data as black and white vectors.



■ **Preserve Colors:** Preserves the layer or level color settings in the external file.



■ Invert Colors: Inverts the colors in the linked file, making them easier to see. If you use a black background in AutoCAD, colors may not be appropriate on a white background in Autodesk Revit.




Positioning

If you followed the guidelines in "Referencing Views and External Data" on page 6, correct alignment is best assured by selecting Automatically place in the Import/Link dialog box.

- Automatically place: Select one of these options for automatic placement:
 - Center-to-center: Aligns the center of the linked or imported file to the center of the Autodesk Revit view. Use this option when external data is offset from the origin of the drawing.
 - Origin to origin: Aligns the origin of the imported or linked file to the origin of the Autodesk Revit view. Use this option when relinking DWG files originally created in Autodesk Revit.
 - By shared coordinates: Acquires origin for use with Autodesk Revit files. Use this option when linking multiple buildings together that need to maintain a relationship to each other, or when linking a number of building files together with a site plan.
- Manually place: If offsets and dislocations were introduced during the process, or if you want to link a detail into a drafting view, these options help position the data that is externally linked:
 - Cursor at origin: The linked file appears attached to the Autodesk Revit cursor at its origin. This is the typical option to manually place data.
 - Cursor at base point: The linked file appears attached to the Autodesk Revit cursor at its base point.
 - **Cursor at center:** The linked file appears attached to the Autodesk Revit cursor at its graphic center point. This option is helpful when handling widely displaced data.
 - Place at level: The linked file appears attached to the designated Autodesk Revit level.


Controlling the Appearance of Linked Data

The appearance of imported or linked data is managed using the Imported Objects tab in the Object Styles dialog box. On the Settings menu, click Object Styles. You can control the line weight, line color, line pattern, and the material for each layer or level in the linked file.




Specifying Line Weights in Linked or Imported Drawings

You can specify line weights in imported files. On the File menu, click Import/Export Settings, and then click Import Line Weights DWG/DXF. This dialog box coordinates color mapping in linked files to Autodesk Revit line weights. The mapping can be saved to or loaded from an external text file.




You can review Autodesk Revit line weight settings by clicking Line Weights on the Settings menu. Because Autodesk Revit line weights have different widths at different scales, many imported colors may map to a single line weight.




Controlling the Visibility of Entities in Linked Files

You control visibility of entities in imported files in the Visibility/Graphic Overrides dialog box. On the DWG/DXF/DGN Categories tab, you can specify visibility by layer for entire imported files or for all imports as a whole.




Step by Step: Exporting to AutoCAD and Relinking to Autodesk Revit




Using a floor plan view as an example, the following steps show you how to use AutoCAD to annotate building model data created in Autodesk Revit.




Step 1: Export the Data

In Autodesk Revit, you can export either single views or entire sheets. When exporting entire sheets, you export the files into different subdirectories, giving each directory the same name as the sheet itself to ensure consistent naming throughout the project.




Step 2: Draft and Annotate in AutoCAD


For each Autodesk Revit view to be annotated in AutoCAD, open a new DWG file using either a template file or Start from Scratch.




Use Attach in the Xref Manager to externally reference the exported views created in Step 1.



Be sure to use 0,0,0, not Specify On-screen, as the insertion point in AutoCAD. Select Overlay for Reference Type. (Unlike Attachment, an overlaid xref is not included when the host drawing is itself attached or overlaid as an xref in another drawing.)



You can now begin drafting and annotating in AutoCAD.




Step 3: Save the Drawing

Save the drawing in the same directory as the linked DWG file. Create the file name by adding a suffix to the name of the linked file. For example, when the linked DWG name is

Floor Plan-Level 1.dwg,

the annotated DWG file should be

Floor Plan-Level 1-ANNO.dwg.




Step 4: Link the Edited DWG File into Autodesk Revit

There are two ways to link edited DWG files. You can link the newly created DWG file with or without the underlying AutoCAD xref attached. Both methods are discussed here.


Linking the File with the Underlying Xref Attached

This method ensures that the data created in the DWG file is precisely inserted into Autodesk Revit, because the originally exported file is still visible. This method is recommended for concurrent use of AutoCAD and Autodesk Revit while annotating views in Autodesk Revit is still underway.

On the Autodesk Revit File menu, click Import/Link > DWG, DXF, DGN, and select the newly-created DWG file in the Import/Link dialog box. Select the Link (instead of import) and the Current view only options. Under Positioning, select Automatically Place, and then select Origin to origin.




After the file is linked, suppress display of the Autodesk Revit-generated elements. In AutoCAD, unload the Autodesk Revit exported file. Return to Autodesk Revit and click Manage Links from the File menu. Select the linked file, and click Reload.



As an alternative, you can turn off layers that were generated by the original export on the DWG/DXF/DGN Categories tab in the Visibility/Graphics Override dialog box. Either method removes display of redundant

Linking the File Without the Underlying Xref

Use this method if you do not need to see the original Autodesk Revit-derived data in the AutoCAD xref. After you annotate the DWG file, you unload the xref, and then save the file before linking it back into Autodesk Revit. In AutoCAD, you now see only the annotation that you created.



When you link the file in Autodesk Revit, the annotation you added externally displays without the redundant display of AutoCAD entitities.


If you need to reference the Autodesk Revit data in AutoCAD in the future, reload the xref in Xref Manager and save the file. It remains visible in AutoCAD, but is not visible when the edited DWG is linked into Autodesk Revit.

Step by Step: Linking DWG Details to Autodesk Revit

The steps in this section show you how to link existing DWG details to an Autodesk Revit project.

Step 1: Create Drafting Views for the DWG Files


For each detail you want to import or link, create and name new drafting views in Autodesk Revit, as shown here.



Step 2: Import or Link the DWG Files


After the drafting view has been created, you either import or link the external file. Open the new drafting view, and on the File menu, click Import/Link ➤ DWG, DXF, DGN. Select the Preserve colors and the Center-to-center options for the best performance.

If you import the file, the data is embedded in the Autodesk Revit project. If you link the files, the result is a smaller Autodesk Revit file that can be further modified in AutoCAD. Autodesk Revit automatically gets the most current version of the linked file whenever the project is opened or the link is reloaded. It is best to use Link if you plan to develop details in AutoCAD. Import is recommended if you plan to modify your details using Autodesk Revit.




Step 3: Place the Details on a Sheet


After arranging the individual detail files in drafting views, open an existing sheet or create a new sheet for the details. On the View menu, click New ➤ Sheet. In the Select a Titleblock dialog box, select the desired titleblock.



After you have created the sheet, place the drafting views. EPlace drafting views in the same way you would place any view created in Autodesk Revit. Either drag the desired views from the Project Browser onto the sheet or, on the View menu, click New ➤ Add View, and then select the desired view.




Place drafting views in the same way you would place any view created in Autodesk Revit. After you have placed the view, the DWG details are part of your Autodesk Revit set.
