4. **RECOGNITION**

• The Board recognized the extensive contributions of **Dr. Robert Nelson** in his volunteer role as Research Scientist, Earth Science and Astronomy. "Dr. Bob's" history of involvement with our programs dates back to 2010, when he was the keynote speaker at the Kepler Scholarship Event. He has been a supporter of the Earth Sciences & Astronomy programs and students ever since. He has volunteered his time to work with students on high-level research projects and has generously provided access to over \$250,000 worth of scientific equipment which has allowed the College to establish a research lab facility in Building 11.

Dr. Nelson volunteers his own time and recruits other scientists to assist Mt. SAC students in conducting advanced-level research projects for Independent Study classes, Research Competitions, and Conference papers. Many of our students have won monetary awards and scholarships as a result of the research they have conducted under "Dr. Bob's" mentoring. Mt. SAC students have used these experiences to help secure admission to top four-year universities. Dr. Nelson deserves recognition for the positive impact he has had on our programs and students.

The Board congratulated the Mt. SAC Turf Team for their outstanding performance at the • recent Annual Student Challenge at the Sports Turf Managers Association's Annual Conference, held in Denver, Colorado, in February. This is a national competition for students pursuing sports turf management as a career. This year, Mt. SAC had nine students competing (two teams of four and an alternate). Although we were not able to defend our National Championship completely, we placed second and third. It pains us that Penn State took first, as we have been able to edge them out for several years now. The second-place team consisted of Araceli Reza, Cody Chavez, Sean Mclaughlin, and Gretchen Heimlich. The third-place team consisted of Kayla Coveny, Oscar Del Real, Andrew Han, and Jessica Weber. Our alternate, Ashley Simpkins, was allowed to participate on a team that only had three members (it happened to be Ohio State). They placed sixth among four-year schools. The Ohio State team attributed a great amount of their success to Ashley's contributions. Overall, it was a very successful competition for Mt. SAC students, and their coaches/professors Brian Scott and Chaz Perea. Mr. Scott was named Educator of the Year, the first time an educator from a two-year college was named.

Academic Senate Report to the Board of Trustees March 25, 2015

Newly-Tenured Faculty

On behalf of the Academic Senate I congratulate the 18 newly-tenured faculty. The great variety of teaching disciplines they represent demonstrate the wide range of instruction we offer our students.

Full Senate Activity

The Senate has had its first two meetings of the year, and acted on the following proposals:

- EEO (Equal Employment Opportunity) Plan Amended the plan to ensure gender-neutral language, and approved the plan unanimously
- Counseling Liaison Proposal Approved a proposal to define, expand and systematize the current Counselor Liaison program.
- Spanish Language Placement Test Proposal Approved a proposal to pilot a language placement test, starting with Spanish language students.
- Early Alert Task Force Recommendations Approved the recommendations, which include modifying the current tutoring and counseling referrals system, piloting a campus-wide Early Alert program, raising awareness of the Early Alert program campus-wide, surveying faculty on an electronic gradebook option integrated with Banner, and funding a Faculty Interest Group (FIG) to discuss the local Early Alert program.
- Leadership Task Force Recommendations Two of the task force's recommendations were approved: 1) have the Executive Board review data from four specified sources, and take any necessary recommendations dictated by the outcome; 2) take several steps to educate new and continuing Senators online and in person.
- Appointments were made to several committees and councils, including the Student Preparation and Success Council, Curriculum and Instruction Council, Faculty Professional Development Committee, Equivalency Committee, Campus Equity and Diversity Committee, and the Web Advisory Board.
- Nominations for Executive Board positions beginning in Fall 2015 opened at the March 19 meeting. The elections for Vice President, Secretary and three Directors will be held on April 23, while three Senator at Large positions will be decided upon May 7.

A special meeting on April 2 will consider the state Academic Senate resolutions, to be voted upon at the ASCCC Spring Plenary on April 9-11.

The following regular meeting on April 9 will consider several action items, including an amendment to the Outcomes Plan, and a revision to AP 4235 Credit by Exam revision.

A day of voluntary professional development activities was held on February 20. Thirteen workshops were presented which addressed the myriad changes we expect in the next year, and the various ways in which faculty can help students. We express our thanks to the President's office and the Faculty Association for providing breakfast and lunch for the faculty. There has been quite of bit of activity to report since we last met. I alluded to this at our last meeting, but we've had some significant breakthroughs. For the first time ever we sent a direct mail solicitation to the attendees of Wassail. We also sent a solicitation to all of the Chamber Singers alumni. This is significant because it is the first time it has been done. It illustrates a coordination and partnership with other areas of campus that previously did not exist. In particular it addresses a challenge that has slowed us down in the past, the issue of bad or no contact information.

Speaking of firsts, we recently sent a communication to a targeted group of individuals who have included Mt. SAC in their Linked In profile. The President himself signed letters to a group of executive level people and invited them to campus to see how Mt. SAC has changed since they've been away. Bob is another example of a person who went on to have tremendous success at another institution (USC) and remains fiercely loyal to Mt. SAC.

Well, we received a check in the Foundation from a 1960s alum that we had no previous contact with. This gentleman and his wife decided it was time to give to Mt. SAC after reading that op ed.

Upcoming activities: On Saturday, April 11 is the Kepler Dinner and Lecture. This is a terrific event that brings in amazing speakers on space science topics. This year the lecturer is Eliot Young, Principal Scientist from the Southwest Research Institute. Mr. Young was a member of the team who discovered Pluto's two moons.

Also, on Saturday, April 18 at the Mountie Baseball game the team will be honoring local Veterans. This is the second year in a row this event is taking place. Foundation Board member Olga Fernandez has taken this idea and run with it. Coach Smith and his staff as well as the players have really embraced this idea.
