- 1. Governor's May Revision Budget Proposal was released on May 13. Highlights are attached.
- Mt. SAC's Tentative Budget for 2016-17 was presented to the Board of Trustees on June 22nd. The PowerPoint presentation is <u>attached</u> and the complete budget book is also <u>attached</u>.
- 3. Aviation employment is still a key element of our regional economy. See the <u>attached Forbes article</u>, "America's Students Take Flight: How Innovative Education Is Curing the Pilot Shortage."
- 4. Five of six community college facility bond measures passed in voting on June 7th. (Details attached.)
- 5. Mt. SAC is one of thirty U.S. community colleges chosen to be part of the American Association of Community College Pathways Project funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The project seeks to transform student experience so they become college ready and enter a program of study to reach graduation in a more timely fashion. The project is support by considerable research including that done by MDRC as reported in their attached paper.

- The U.S. Department of Education has expanded the Pell Financial Aid Grant system to include Pell grants for high school students who are dual enrolled in high school and college. The official announcement is <u>attached</u>.
- 8. The California State University System has reached agreement with the faculty on a multi-year salary increase. A 5% general raise was implemented on June 30. Then on July 1, a 2% raise will take effect, giving faculty essentially a 7% salary increase. In July 2017, another 3.5% increase will be added, and faculty who qualify for service credit will receive an additional 2.65% increase. All told, the 10.5% increase will cost the Cal State system about \$200 million. More information is <u>attached</u>.
- 9. The National Bureau of Economic Research has released a report (<u>link</u>) showing students who attend for-profit colleges end up earning less money five to six years after attendance than they did before they enrolled. Author Stephanie Riegg Cellini states in an article in *Diverse* (<u>attached</u>), "These negative average effects are largely generated by the high proportion of students (who) do not complete their program of study,"
